1 AN ACT Relating to the capital budget; making appropriations and
2 authorizing expenditures for capital improvements; amending RCW
3 43.34.080, 28B.15.210, 28B.20.725, 28B.15.310, 28B.30.750, 28B.35.370,

15 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

16 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1.** (1) A capital budget is hereby adopted and,
17 subject to the provisions set forth in this act, the several dollar
18 amounts hereinafter specified, or so much thereof as shall be
19 sufficient to accomplish the purposes designated, are hereby

1 appropriated and authorized to be incurred for capital projects during
2 the period beginning with the effective date of this act and ending
3 June 30, 2015, out of the several funds specified in this act.

4 (2) The definitions in this subsection apply throughout this act
5 unless the context clearly requires otherwise.

6 (a) "Fiscal year 2014" or "FY 2014" means the period beginning July
7 1, 2013, and ending June 30, 2014.

8 (b) "Fiscal year 2015" or "FY 2015" means the period beginning July
9 1, 2014, and ending June 30, 2015.

10 (c) "Lapse" or "revert" means the amount shall return to an
11 unappropriated status.

12 (d) "Provided solely" means the specified amount may be spent only
13 for the specified purpose.

14 (3) Unless otherwise specifically authorized in this act, any
15 portion of an amount provided solely for a specified purpose that is
16 not expended subject to the specified conditions and limitations to
17 fulfill the specified purpose shall lapse.

18 (4) The amounts shown under the headings "Prior Biennia," "Future
19 Biennia," and "Total" in this act are for informational purposes only
20 and do not constitute legislative approval of these amounts. "Prior
21 biennia" typically refers to the immediate prior biennium for
22 reappropriations, but may refer to multiple biennia in the case of
23 specific projects. A "future biennia" amount is an estimate of what
24 may be appropriated for the project or program in the 2015-2017
25 biennium and the following three biennia; an amount of zero does not
26 necessarily constitute legislative intent to not provide funding for
27 the project or program in the future.

28 (5) "Reappropriations" in this act are appropriations and, unless
29 the context clearly provides otherwise, are subject to the relevant
30 conditions and limitations applicable to appropriations.
31 Reappropriations shall be limited to the unexpended balances remaining
32 on June 30, 2013, from the 2011-2013 biennial appropriations for each
33 project.

2 **MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS**

3 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 7001.** RCW 43.88.031 requires the disclosure of
4 the estimated debt service costs associated with new capital bond
5 appropriations. The estimated debt service costs for the
6 appropriations contained in this act are twenty-nine million eight
7 hundred sixty-five thousand dollars for the 2013-2015 biennium, one
8 hundred eighty-three million six hundred ninety-five thousand dollars
9 for the 2015-2017 biennium, and two hundred sixty million seven hundred
10 eighty thousand dollars for the 2017-2019 biennium.

11 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 7002.** (1) Allotments for appropriations in this
12 act shall be provided in accordance with the capital project review
13 requirements adopted by the office of financial management and in
14 compliance with RCW 43.88.110. Projects that will be employing
15 alternative public works construction procedures under chapter 39.10
16 RCW are subject to the allotment procedures defined in this section and

18 (2) Each project is defined as proposed in the legislative budget
