16 high-speed, open-access broadband service, to rural and underserved  
17 communities, for the purposes of economic development or community  
18 development. However, no more than 50 percent of all financial  
19 assistance approved by the board in any biennium may consist of  
20 grants to local governments or federally recognized Indian tribes.

21       (2) Application for funding must be made in the form and manner  
22 as the board may prescribe. In making grants or loans the board must

38 located in a rural community as defined by the board, or located in a

1 rural county, that encourage, foster, develop, and improve broadband  
2 within the state in order to:

3 (i) Drive job creation, promote innovation, and expand markets  
4 for local businesses;

5 (ii) Serve the ongoing and growing needs of local education  
6 systems, health care systems, public safety systems, industries and  
7 businesses, governmental operations, and citizens; and

8 (iii) Improve accessibility for underserved communities and  
9 populations.

10 (c) An application must be approved by the local government and  
11 supported by the local associate development organization or local  
12 workforce development council or approved by the governing body of  
13 the federally recognized Indian tribe.

14 (d) The board may allow de minimis general system improvements to  
15 be funded if they are critically linked to the viability of the  
16 project.

17 (e) When evaluating and prioritizing projects, the board must  
18 give consideration, at a minimum, to the following factors:

19 (i) The project's value to the community, including evidence of  
20 support from affected local businesses and government;

21 (ii) The project's feasibility, using standard economic  
22 principles;

23 (iii) Commitment of local matching resources and local  
24 participation;

25 (iv) The project's inclusion in a capital facilities plan,  
26 comprehensive plan, or local economic development plan consistent  
27 with applicable state planning requirements; and

28 (v) The project's readiness to proceed.

29 (3) A responsible official of the local government or the  
30 federally recognized Indian tribe must be present during community  
31 economic revitalization board deliberations and provide information  
32 that the board requests.

33 (4) Before any financial assistance application is approved, the  
34 local government or the federally recognized Indian tribe seeking the  
35 assistance must demonstrate to the community economic revitalization  
36 board that no other timely source of funding is available to it at  
37 costs reasonably similar to financing available from the board.

38 (5) The appropriations must be used for projects that use a  
39 technology-neutral approach in order to expand access at the lowest

30 (2) The department must establish a competitive process to  
31 solicit proposals for and prioritize projects whose primary objective  
32 is to assist libraries operated by governmental units, as defined in  
33 RCW 27.12.010, in acquiring, constructing, repairing, or  
34 rehabilitating facilities.

35 (3) The department must establish a committee to develop the  
36 grant program criteria and review proposals. The committee must be  
37 composed of five members as provided in this subsection. The  
38 committee must include: (a) A representative from the department of  
39 commerce; (b) a representative from the department of archaeology and

1 historic preservation; (c) the state librarian; (d) a representative  
2 from a library district; and (e) a representative from a municipal  
3 library.

4 (4) The department must conduct a statewide solicitation of  
5 project applications. The department must evaluate and rank  
6 applications in consultation with the committee established in  
7 subsection (3) of this section, using objective criteria. The ranking  
8 of projects must prioritize library district facilities listed on a  
9 local, state, or federal register of historic places and those  
10 located in distressed or rural counties. The evaluation and ranking  
11 process must also include an examination of existing assets that  
12 applicants propose to apply to projects. Grant assistance under this  
13 section may not exceed 50 percent of the total cost of the project.  
14 The nonstate portion of the total project cost may include cash, the  
15 value of real property when acquired solely for the purpose of the  
16 project, and in-kind contributions.

17 (5) The department must submit a prioritized list of recommended  
18 projects to the governor and the legislature by October 1, 2022, for  
19 inclusion in the department of commerce's 2023-2025 biennial capital  
20 budget request. The list must include a description of each project,  
21 the amount of recommended state funding, and documentation of  
22 nonstate funds to be used for the project. Individual grants may not  
23 exceed \$2,000,000. The total amount of recommended state funding for  
24 the projects on a biennial project list may not exceed \$10,000,000.

25 (6) In contracts for grants authorized under this section, the  
26 department must include provisions that require that capital  
27 improvements be held by the grantee for a specified period of time  
28 appropriate to the amount of the grant and that facilities be used  
29 for the express purpose of the grant. If the grantee is found to be  
30 out of compliance with provisions of the contract, the grantee must  
31 repay to the state general fund the principal amount of the grant  
32 plus interest calculated at the rate of interest on state of  
33 Washington general obligation bonds issued on the date most close in  
34 time to the date of authorization of the grant.

23       (2) The 2021 state energy strategy must guide the department in

25 environmental justice lens for program structure and participation.  
26 To the extent practicable, the department must prioritize projects  
27 that build upon Washington's existing strengths in communities,  
28 aerospace, maritime, information and communications technology

The appropriation in this section is subject to the following conditions and limitations:

(1) The department may not expend the appropriation provided in this section unless and until the nonstate share of project costs have been either expended or firmly committed, or both, in an amount sufficient to complete the project or a distinct phase of the project that is useable to the public for the purpose intended by the legislature. This requirement does not apply to projects where a share of the appropriation is for design costs only.

(2) Prior to receiving funds, project recipients must demonstrate that the project site is under control for a minimum of 10 years, either through ownership or a long-term lease. This requirement does not apply to appropriations for preconstruction activities or appropriations in which the sole purpose is to purchase real property that does not include a construction or renovation component.

(3) Projects funded in this section may be required to comply with Washington's high-performance building standards as required by chapter 39.35D RCW.

(4) Project funds are available on a reimbursement basis only and may not be advanced under any circumstances.

23 (c) Outline the environmental project review data collection  
24 process in functional detail and use existing data gathering  
25 resources such as EC3; and

26 (d) Identify measurable outcome criteria to establish a project  
27 baseline summary for use during design from estimated project  
28 material quantities using industry average environmental product  
29 declarations.

30 (3) The work group shall provide their recommendations in a  
31 report to the fiscal committees of the legislature by (~~January 1,~~  
32 ~~2022~~) June 30, 2022.

33 (d) Identify measurable outcome criteria to establish a project  
34 baseline summary for use during design from estimated project  
35 material quantities using industry average environmental product  
36 declarations; and

37 (e) Identify sustainable and low-carbon emitting building  
38 materials, including but not limited to, aggregate and recycled  
39 concrete materials, as described in subsection (4) of this section.



1 (3) The work group shall provide their recommendations in a  
2 report to the fiscal committees of the legislature by January 1,  
3 2022.

4 (4)(a) The legislature continues to prioritize Washington state's  
5 sustainability goals and reaffirms its determination that recyclable  
6 construction aggregate and recycled concrete materials are too  
7 valuable to be wasted and landfilled. The legislature further finds  
8 that the reuse of construction aggregate and recycled concrete  
9 materials into construction projects is known to:

10 (i) Reduce the need for consumption of new construction aggregate  
11 materials and conserves existing aggregate resources;

12 (ii) Encourages reuse and recycling, reduces waste, and  
13 discourages landfilling of readily available natural resources;

14 (iii) Reduces truck trips and related transportation emissions;  
15 and

16 (iv) Reduces greenhouse gases related to the construction of  
17 state funded construction projects, reduce embodied energy, and  
18 improve and advance the sustainable principles and practices of  
19 Washington state.

20 (b) These recyclable materials have well established markets, are  
21 substantially a primary or secondary product of necessary  
22 construction processes and production, as a commodity substantially  
23 meets widely recognized international, national, and local standards  
24 and specifications, and are managed as an item of commercial value.

25 **Sec. 7008.** RCW 43.83B.430 and 2020 c 168 s 6 are each amended to  
26 read as follows:

27 The state drought preparedness and response account is created in  
28 the state treasury. All receipts from appropriated funds designated  
29 for the account and all cost recovery revenues collected under RCW  
30 43.83B.410(5) must be deposited into the account. Expenditures from  
31 the account may be used for drought preparedness and response  
32 activities under this chapter, including grants issued under RCW  
33 43.83B.415. Moneys in the account may be spent only after  
34 appropriation. During the 2021-2023 fiscal biennium, the legislature  
35 may appropriate moneys from the account for activities related to  
36 water banking.

37 **Sec. 7009.** RCW 43.155.050 and 2021 c 334 s 979 and 2021 c 332 s  
38 7031 are each reenacted and amended to read as follows:

1       The public works assistance account is hereby established in the  
2 state treasury. Money may be placed in the public works assistance  
3 account from the proceeds of bonds when authorized by the legislature  
4 or from any other lawful source. Money in the public works assistance  
5 account shall be used to make loans and grants and to give financial  
6 guarantees to local governments for public works projects. Moneys in  
7 the account may also be appropriated or transferred to the water  
8 pollution control revolving fund and the drinking water assistance  
9 account to provide for state match requirements under federal law.  
10 Not more than twenty percent of the biennial capital budget  
11 appropriation to the public works board from this account may be  
12 expended or obligated for preconstruction loans and grants, emergency  
13 loans and grants, or loans and grants for capital facility planning  
14 under this chapter. Not more than ten percent of the biennial capital  
15 budget appropriation to the public works board from this account may  
16 be expended or obligated as grants for preconstruction, emergency,  
17 capital facility planning, and construction projects. During the  
18 2017-2019 and 2019-2021 fiscal biennia, the legislature may  
19 appropriate moneys from the account for activities related to rural  
20 economic development, the growth management act, the aviation  
21 revitalization loan program, the community economic revitalization  
22 board broadband program, and the voluntary stewardship program.  
23 During the 2021-2023 biennium, the legislature may appropriate moneys  
24 from the account for activities related to the aviation  
25 revitalization board. During the 2019-2021 fiscal biennia, the  
26 legislature may direct the state treasurer to make transfers of  
27 moneys in the public works assistance account to the education legacy  
28 trust account. During the 2019-2021 and 2021-2023 fiscal biennia, the  
29 legislature may direct the state treasurer to make transfers of  
30 moneys in the public works assistance account to the statewide  
31 broadband account. During the 2021-2023 fiscal biennium, the  
32 legislature may appropriate moneys from the public works assistance  
33 account for activities related to the voluntary stewardship program,  
34 rural economic development, and the growth management act. During the  
35 2021-2023 biennium, the legislature may appropriate moneys from the  
36 account for projects identified in section 1033 of this act.

37       NEW SECTION.   **Sec. 7010.**   The energy efficiency revolving loan  
38 capitalization account is created in the state treasury. All moneys  
39 received by the state from the energy efficiency revolving loan fund

1 capitalization grant program created in section 40502 of P.L. 117-58  
2 (infrastructure investment and jobs act) must be deposited into the  
3 account. The account may also receive legislative transfers and  
4 appropriations and all other revenues directed for deposit into the  
5 account. Moneys in the account may be spent only after appropriation.  
6 Expenditures from the account may be used to make grants or loans,  
7 and to provide technical assistance, to conduct energy audits and to  
8 implement audit strategies to increase the energy efficiency of  
9 residential and commercial buildings and facilities.

10 **Sec. 7011.** RCW 43.19.501 and 2021 c 332 s 7013 are each amended  
11 to read as follows:

12 The Thurston county capital facilities account is created in the  
13 state treasury. The account is subject to the appropriation and  
14 allotment procedures under chapter 43.88 RCW. Moneys in the account  
15 may be expended for capital projects in facilities owned and managed  
16 by the department in Thurston county.

17 During the 2019-2021 and 2021-2023 fiscal biennia, the Thurston  
18 county capital facilities account may be appropriated for costs  
19 associated with staffing to support capital budget and project  
20 activities and lease and facility oversight activities. During the  
21 2021-2023 fiscal biennium, the Thurston county capital facilities  
22 account may be appropriated for activities related to Capitol Lake  
23 long-term management planning, as provided in section 1057 of this  
24 act.

25 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 7012.** The state board for community and  
26 technical colleges was tasked by the legislature in section 7038,  
27 chapter 332, Laws of 2021 to report on alternative methods of  
28 prioritizing and presenting the list of requested capital projects  
29 for community and technical colleges in the 2023-2025 fiscal  
30 biennium. The state board for community and technical colleges shall  
31 implement for the 2023-2025 fiscal biennium the report's option of a  
32 single prioritized request with minor projects above major projects  
33 and with all of the funding needed for design and construction  
34 included in a single biennium. However, in recognition of the  
35 transition to this new prioritized request method, projects that  
36 received funding for design only in the 2019-2021 or 2021-2023 fiscal  
37 biennia must receive priority over new major project requests in the  
38 2023-2025 fiscal biennium request.

1        NEW SECTION.    **Sec. 7013.**    If any provision of this act or its  
2 application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the  
3 remainder of the act or the application of the provision to other  
4 persons or circumstances is not affected.

5        NEW SECTION.    **Sec. 7014.**    This act is necessary for the immediate  
6 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of  
7 the state government and its existing public institutions, and takes  
8 effect immediately."

EFFECT:    The striking amendment authorizes new capital appropriations of \$1.5 billion in total funds, of which \$107 million is financed with state general obligation bonds.
