1 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1.** A supplemental capital budget is hereby
2 adopted and, subject to the provisions set forth in this act, the
3 several dollar amounts hereinafter specified, or so much thereof as
4 shall be sufficient to accomplish the purposes designated, are hereby
5 appropriated and authorized to be incurred for capital projects
6 during the period beginning with the effective date of this act and
7 ending June 30, 2023, out of the several funds specified in this act.

The (~~reappropriations~~) appropriations in this section are subject to the following conditions and limitations: The (~~reappropriations~~) appropriations are subject to the provisions of section 6001, chapter 356, Laws of 2020. Section 6001, chapter 356, Laws of 2020 is set forth in full below, except that new language is added to subsection (1)(f)(x) of this section, which supersedes the requirements of subsection (1)(f)(x) in section 6001, chapter 356, Laws of 2020.

(1) \$83,500,000 of the state taxable building construction account—state appropriation, \$19,631,000 of the state building construction account—state appropriation, and \$8,658,000 of the Washington housing trust account—state appropriation are provided solely for affordable housing and preservation of affordable housing. Of the amounts in this subsection:

(a) \$24,370,000 is provided solely for housing projects that provide supportive housing and case-management services to persons with chronic mental illness. The department must prioritize low-income supportive housing unit proposals that provide services or include a partner community behavioral health treatment provider;

(b) \$10,000,000 is provided solely for housing preservation grants or loans to be awarded competitively. The grants may be provided for major building improvements, preservation, and system replacements necessary for the existing housing trust fund portfolio to maintain long-term viability. The department must require that a capital needs assessment is performed to estimate the cost of the preservation project at contract execution. Funds may not be used to add or expand the capacity of the property. To receive grants, housing projects must meet the following requirements:

(i) The property is more than 15 years old;

(ii) At least 50 percent of the housing units are occupied by families and individuals at or below 30 percent area median income;

(iii) The improvements will result in reduction of operating or utilities costs, or both; and

1 (iv) Other criteria that the department considers necessary to
2 achieve the purpose of this program.

3 (c) \$5,000,000 is provided solely for housing projects that
4 benefit people at or below 80 percent of the area median income who
5 have been displaced by a natural disaster declared by the governor,
6 including people who have been displaced within the last two biennia.

7 (d) \$1,000,000 of the Washington housing trust account—state
8 appropriation is provided solely for the department to work with the
9 communities of concern commission to focus on creating capital assets
10 that will help reduce poverty and build stronger and more sustainable
11 communities using the communities' cultural understanding and vision.
12 The funding must be used for predevelopment costs for capital
13 projects identified by the commission and for other activities to
14 assist communities in developing capacity to create community-owned
15 capital assets.

16 (e) \$1,000,000 of the Washington housing trust account—state
17 appropriation and \$1,500,000 of the state taxable building
18 construction account—state appropriation are provided solely for the
19 department to contract directly with YouthCare Service Center to
20 purchase the 1534 Broadway site from Capitol Hill Housing in order
21 for YouthCare Service Center to develop a youth community center.

38 (x) \$7,500,000 is provided solely for grants for high quality
39 low-income housing projects that will quickly move people from

1 homelessness into secure housing and are significantly less expensive
2 to construct than traditional housing. It is the intent of the
3 legislature that these grants serve projects with a total project
4 development cost per housing unit of less than \$200,000, excluding
5 the value of land, and with a commitment by the applicant to maintain
6 the housing units for at least a 25 year period. Amounts provided
7 that are subject to this subsection (1)(f)(x) must be used to plan,
8 predesign, design, provide technical assistance and financial
9 services, purchase land for, and build innovative low-income housing
10 units. \$4,500,000 of the appropriation that is subject to this
11 subsection is provided solely for innovative affordable housing in
12 Shelton and \$3,000,000 of the appropriation that is subject to this
13 subsection (1)(f)(x) is provided solely for innovative affordable
14 housing for veterans in Orting. Mental health and substance abuse
15 counseling services must be offered to residents of housing projects
16 supported by appropriations in this subsection (1)(f)(x). \$500,000 of
17 the appropriation for housing units in Shelton can be released for
18 purchase of land, planning, or predesign services before the project
19 is fully funded. \$500,000 of the appropriation for housing units in
20 Orting can be released for purchase of land, planning, or predesign
21 services before the project is fully funded.

22 (xi) \$7,290,000 is provided solely for grants to the following
23 organizations using innovative methods to address homelessness:
24 \$4,290,000 for THA Arlington drive youth campus in Tacoma and
25 \$3,000,000 for a King county housing project.

26 (xii) \$1,500,000 is provided solely for Valley Cities modular
27 housing project in Auburn.

28 (g) Of the amounts appropriated remaining after (a) through (f)
29 of this subsection, the department must allocate the funds as
30 follows:

31 (i) Ten percent is provided solely for housing projects that
32 benefit veterans;

33 (ii) Ten percent is provided solely for housing projects that
34 benefit homeownership;

35 (iii) Five percent is provided solely for housing projects that
36 benefit people with developmental disabilities; and

37 (iv) The remaining amount is provided solely for projects that
38 serve low-income and special needs populations in need of housing,
39 including, but not limited to, homeless families with children,
40 homeless youth, farmworkers, and seniors.

1 (2) In evaluating projects in this section, the department must
2 give preference for applications based on some or all of the criteria
3 in RCW 43.185.070(5).

4 (3) The department must strive to allocate all of the amounts
5 appropriated in this section within the 2017-2019 fiscal biennium in
6 the manner prescribed in subsection (1) of this section. However, if
7 upon review of applications the department determines there are not
8 adequate suitable projects in a category, the department may allocate
9 funds to projects serving other low-income and special needs
10 populations, provided those projects are located in an area with an
11 identified need for the type of housing proposed.

26 (2) The department must establish a competitive process to
27 solicit proposals for and prioritize projects whose primary objective
28 is to assist libraries operated by governmental units, as defined in
29 RCW 27.12.010, in acquiring, constructing, repairing, or
30 rehabilitating facilities.

31 (3) The department must establish a committee to develop the
32 grant program criteria and review proposals. The committee must be
33 composed of five members as provided in this subsection. The
34 committee must include: (a) A representative from the department of
35 commerce; (b) a representative from the department of archaeology and
36 historic preservation; (c) the state librarian; (d) a representative
37 from a library district; and (e) a representative from a municipal
38 library.

39 (4) The department must conduct a statewide solicitation of
40 project applications. The department must evaluate and rank

1 applications in consultation with the committee established in
2 subsection (3) of this section, using objective criteria. The ranking
3 of projects must prioritize library district facilities listed on a
4 local, state, or federal register of historic places and those
5 located in distressed or rural counties. The evaluation and ranking
6 process must also include an examination of existing assets that
7 applicants propose to apply to projects. Grant assistance under this
8 section may not exceed 50 percent of the total cost of the project.
9 The nonstate portion of the total project cost may include cash, the
10 value of real property when acquired solely for the purpose of the
11 project, and in-kind contributions.

12 (5) The department must submit a prioritized list of recommended
13 projects to the governor and the legislature by October 1, 2022, for
14 inclusion in the department of commerce's 2023-2025 biennial capital
15 budget request. The list must include a description of each project,
16 the amount of recommended state funding, and documentation of
17 nonstate funds to be used for the project. Individual grants may not
18 exceed \$2,000,000. The total amount of recommended state funding for
19 the projects on a biennial project list may not exceed \$10,000,000.

20 (6) In contracts for grants authorized under this section, the
21 department must include provisions that require that capital
22 improvements be held by the grantee for a specified period of time
23 appropriate to the amount of the grant and that facilities be used
24 for the express purpose of the grant. If the grantee is found to be
25 out of compliance with provisions of the contract, the grantee must
26 repay to the state general fund the principal amount of the grant
27 plus interest calculated at the rate of interest on state of
28 Washington general obligation bonds issued on the date most close in
29 time to the date of authorization of the grant.

30 (7) The department must assist grant recipients under this
31 section to apply for applicable competitive federal grant funding
32 and, upon receipt of any such funding, an equal amount of the state
33 building construction account—state appropriation must be placed in
34 unallotted status.

8 The appropriations in this section are subject to the following
9 conditions and limitations:

10 (1) The appropriations in this section are provided solely for
11 projects that provide a benefit to the public through development,
12 demonstration, and deployment of clean energy technologies that save
13 energy and reduce energy costs, reduce harmful air emissions, or
14 increase energy independence for the state. Priority must be given to
15 projects that benefit vulnerable populations and overburdened
16 communities, including tribes and communities with high environmental
17 or energy burdens.

18 (2) The 2021 state energy strategy must guide the department in
19 the design of programs under this section, using an equity and
20 environmental justice lens for program structure and participation.
21 To the extent practicable, the department must prioritize projects
22 that build upon Washington's existing strengths in communities,
23 aerospace, maritime, information and communications technology
24 (particularly data center infrastructure, artificial intelligence and
25 machine learning), grid modernization, advanced materials, and
26 decarbonizing the built environment.

27 (3) Subject to the availability of funds, the department must
28 reconvene an advisory committee to support involvement of a broad
29 range of stakeholders in the design and implementation of programs
30 implemented under this section to encourage collaboration, leverage
31 partners, and engage communities and organizations in improving the
32 equitable distribution of benefits from the program.

33 (4) In soliciting and evaluating proposals, awarding contracts,
34 and monitoring projects under this section, the department must:

35 (a) Ensure that competitive processes, rather than sole source
36 contracting processes, are used to select all projects, except as
37 otherwise noted in this section; and

1 (b) Conduct due diligence activities associated with the use of
2 public funds including, but not limited to, oversight of the project
3 selection process, project monitoring, and ensuring that all
4 applications and contracts fully comply with all applicable laws
5 including disclosure and conflict of interest statutes.

6 (5) During project solicitation periods for grants funded with
7 this appropriation, the department must maintain a list of applicants
8 by grant program that scored competitively but did not receive a
9 grant award due to lack of available funding. These applicants must
10 be considered for funding during future grant award cycles. If the
11 department submits a 2022 supplemental budget request for this
12 program, the request must include a list of prioritized projects by
13 grant type.

14 (6)(a) Pursuant to chapter 42.52 RCW, the ethics in public
15 service act, the department must require a project applicant to
16 identify in application materials any state of Washington employees
17 or former state employees employed by the firm or on the firm's
18 governing board during the past 24 months. Application materials must
19 identify the individual by name, the agency previously or currently
20 employing the individual, job title or position held, and separation
21 date. If it is determined by the department that a conflict of
22 interest exists, the applicant may be disqualified from further
23 consideration for award of funding.

24 (b) If the department finds, after due notice and examination,
25 that there is a violation of chapter 42.52 RCW, or any similar
26 statute involving a grantee who received funding under this section,
27 either in procuring or performing under the grant, the department in
28 its sole discretion may terminate the funding grant by written
29 notice. If the grant is terminated, the department must reserve its
30 right to pursue all available remedies under law to address the
31 violation.

32 (7) The requirements in subsections (4) and (6) of this section
33 must be specified in funding agreements issued by the department.

34 (8) \$17,594,000 of the state building construction account—state
35 appropriation is provided solely for grid modernization grants.

36 (a)(i) \$11,000,000 is provided solely for projects that: Advance
37 community resilience, clean and renewable energy technologies and
38 transmission and distribution control systems; support integration of
39 renewable energy sources, deployment of distributed energy resources
40 and sustainable microgrids; and support state decarbonization goals

1 pursuant to the clean energy transformation act, including
2 requirements placed upon retail electric utilities.

3 (ii) Projects must be implemented by community organizations,
4 local governments, federally recognized tribal governments, or by
5 public and private electrical utilities that serve retail customers
6 in the state (retail electric utilities). Projects submitted by
7 applicants other than retail electric utilities must demonstrate
8 partnership with their load serving entity to apply. Priority must be
9 given to:

10 (A) Projects that benefit vulnerable populations, including
11 tribes and communities with high environmental or energy burden; and

12 (B) Projects that demonstrate partnerships between eligible
13 applicants in applying for funding, including utilities, public and
14 private sector research organizations, businesses, tribes, and
15 nonprofit organizations.

16 (iii) The department shall develop a grant application process to
17 competitively select projects for grant awards, to include scoring
18 conducted by a group of qualified experts with application of
19 criteria specified by the department. In development of the
20 application criteria, the department shall, to the extent possible,
21 develop program guidelines that encourage smaller utilities or
22 consortia of small utilities to apply for funding. Where suitable,
23 this may include funding for projects consisting solely of planning,
24 predesign and/or predevelopment activities.

25 (iv) Applications for grants must disclose all sources of public
26 funds invested in a project.

27 (b) \$3,550,000 of the appropriation in this section is provided
28 solely for a grant to the Public Utility District No. 1 of Lewis
29 county for land acquisition and construction of the Winlock
30 Industrial Park and South County Substation and Transmission
31 facility, located on North Military Road in Winlock.

32 (c) \$3,044,000 of the appropriation in this section is provided
33 solely for a grant to the Klickitat County Public Hospital District
34 #1 for the Electrical Upgrade and Smart Grid project at the Klickitat
35 Valley Health Hospital in Goldendale.

36 (9) \$10,830,000 of the state building construction account—state
37 appropriation is provided solely for grants for strategic research
38 and development for new and emerging clean energy technologies. These
39 grants must be used to match federal or other nonstate funds to
40 research, develop, and demonstrate clean energy technologies,

1 focusing on areas that help develop technologies to meet the state's
2 climate goals, offer opportunities for economic and job growth, and
3 strengthen technology supply chains. The program may include, but is
4 not limited to: Solar technologies, advanced bioenergy and biofuels,
5 development of new earth abundant materials or lightweight materials,
6 advanced energy storage, recycling energy system components, and new

11 prioritizing and presenting the list of requested capital projects
12 for community and technical colleges in the 2023-2025 fiscal
13 biennium. The state board for community and technical colleges shall
14 implement for the 2023-2025 fiscal biennium the report's option of a
15 single prioritized request with minor projects above major projects
16 and with all of the funding needed for design and construction
17 included in a single biennium. However, in recognition of the
18 transition to this new prioritized request method, projects that
19 received funding for design only in the 2019-2021 or 2021-2023 fiscal
20 biennia must receive priority over new major project request in the
21 2023-2025 fiscal biennium request.

22 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 7009.** The energy efficiency revolving loan
23 capitalization account is created in the state treasury. All moneys
24 received by the state from the energy efficiency revolving loan fund
25 capitalization grant program created in section 40502 of P.L. 117-58
26 (infrastructure investment and jobs act) must be deposited into the
27 account. The account may also receive legislative transfers and
28 appropriations and all other revenues directed for deposit into the
29 account. Moneys in the account may be spent only after appropriation.
30 Expenditures from the account may be used to make grants or loans,
31 and to provide technical assistance, to conduct energy audits and to
32 implement audit strategies to increase the energy efficiency of
33 residential and commercial buildings and facilities.

34 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 7010.** If any provision of this act or its
35 application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the
36 remainder of the act or the application of the provision to other
37 persons or circumstances is not affected.

1 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 7011.** This act is necessary for the immediate
2 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of
3 the state government and its existing public institutions, and takes
4 effect immediately.
