

Transportation & Capital Projects Web Mapping Information & FAQ

Transportation and Capital Projects web mapping is a result of legislation passed into law (Chapter 327, Laws of 2013) requiring the Legislative Evaluation and Accountability Program Committee, in collaboration with the Office of Financial Management, to provide state capital budget and transportation budget appropriation and expenditure data to the public by legislative district and county in a format easy to navigate and comprehend. The legislation further states these projects be accessible from an online geographical map.

Why can't I find some projects on the map that I see on reports for my district/county? Some projects, such as guardrail projects that span many locations, receive a pool of money that is allocated for the project vs for a specific location. These projects do not have geographic codes and therefore cannot be placed on the map.

What does "Capital Subproject" mean (in the legend on the map page)? It is referring to "subprojects" which are a component of a larger project in the Capital Budget. For example, in the Department of Commerce there is a project called "Projects that Strengthen Youth and Families". Funding for that project is distributed to multiple districts/counties. Those distributions are called Subprojects.

How often is this information updated? Budget information will be updated after a new Capital and/or Transportation budget is enacted into law. Expenditure information (what has been spent to date), is updated monthly.
