### **House Capital Budget Chair Proposal**

The 2012 House Capital Budget Chair proposal includes three separate pieces of legislation including a traditional supplemental capital budget bill, a special tax obligation/Aquatic Lands Enhancement Account (ALEA) bond bill, and a lottery revenue bond bill. New spending from all fund sources totals approximately \$1.3 billion.

### **Traditional Supplemental Capital Budget (\$673.9 million)**

The traditional supplemental capital budget appropriates \$155.2 million in existing bond capacity authorized in the 2011 legislative session. This capacity primarily exists due to a continued favorable bid climate, using new dedicated cash resources to free up bonds in the 2011-13 capital budgets, and a reduced need for bond resources into the School Construction Assistance Program.

The traditional supplemental budget also appropriates \$299.1 million from dedicated accounts and authorizes \$219.7 million in alternatively financed projects.

### Special Tax Obligation/ALEA Bonds (\$484.7 million)

This legislation authorizes bonds backed by four separate capital budget revenue sources including:

- Hazardous Substance Tax (\$215 million) Appropriations from this source must be related to environmental cleanup and restoration.
- Solid Waste Tax (\$163.4 million) Appropriations from this source must be related to state aid for local government capital construction.
- Public Utility Tax (\$66.6 million) Appropriations from this source must be related to water quality improvement and safe drinking water.
- Aquatic Lands Enhancement Account (\$39.7 million) Appropriations from this source must be related to forest to shore restoration.

### **Lottery Revenue Bonds (\$153.6 million)**

This legislation authorizes bonds backed by lottery revenue. Appropriations from this source must be related to education and workforce development.

### House Capital Budget Chair Proposal Combined Highlights

### **Public School Construction**

A total of \$37.5 million is appropriated for projects at the state's vocational skills centers including:

- \$18.8 million for the Grant County Branch Campus of the Wenatchee Valley Skills Center;
- \$11.7 million for the SEA-TECH branch campus of the Tri-Tech Skills Center;
- \$4.8 million for the Pierce County Skills Center; and
- \$2.1 million for design of the Puget Sound Skills Center.

Additionally, \$26 million is provided for urgent school facility repair and renovation grants to address unforeseen health and safety needs, and for distressed schools.

### **Higher Education**

A total of \$251 million is appropriated for higher education including:

- \$62.5 million for University of Washington Bothell Phase 3;
- \$50 million for the community and technical colleges' Administrative Systems Replacement;
- \$38.9 million for Washington State University Riverpoint Biomedical and Health Sciences Phase 2;
- \$38.6 million for Lower Columbia Health and Science Building;
- \$30.6 million for Skagit Valley College Academic and Student Services Building;
- \$20 million for vocational and high tech training equipment for the community and technical colleges;
- \$4 million for Everett Community College Corporate and Continuing Education Center renovation;
- \$3.1 million for Spokane Community College Building 15 addition;
- \$1.8 million for engineering laboratory equipment for Washington State University; and
- \$2.3 million for equipment at the Washington Aerospace Training and Research Center.

### **Energy Efficiency, New Energy and Weatherization**

\$108 million is provided for competitively-awarded grants for projects that will reduce energy and operational costs at local government, K-12 and higher educational facilities. In addition, \$5 million is set aside for competitive grants to local agencies for installation of Washington-manufactured solar energy systems in public buildings.

\$5 million is provided to help local governments finance investment grade energy audits or to implement measures identified in the audits to capture water and energy savings.

Weatherization activities are funded at \$25 million: \$10 million to improve the energy efficiency, durability, health and safety of homes occupied by low-income households, and \$15 million to continue a pilot program that delivers energy efficiency services and incentives to moderate-income households and small businesses.

### Environmental Clean Up, Restoration, Protection, and Water Quality

\$72 million is provided for capital projects designed to improve state hatcheries, wildlife areas, access sites, dams and dikes, fish passage barriers, forest health, and forest roads. Projects will involve earthwork and site development, construction, correction of barriers, fencing, and forest health treatments such as thinning and prescribed burning.

An additional \$10 million is targeted to help small landowners with 75 to 100 percent of the costs of repairing or removing fish passage barriers on forest road crossings over streams on their properties. Projects are handled on a "worst first" basis and there is currently a backlog of more than 400 projects.

Three ranked lists of projects focused on clean-up of toxics sites are targeted for \$77 million through Department of Ecology programs: Eastern Washington Clean Sites Initiative (11 projects, \$11.1 million); Clean-Up Toxics Sites - Puget Sound (14 projects, \$33.3 million); and Remedial Action Grants (15 projects, \$33.2 million).

The State Conservation Commission receives \$1.27 million to carry out existing and new contracts with private landowners to voluntarily install and maintain riparian buffers under the Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP). In addition, \$5 million is provided to the Commission for conservation district assistance to private landowners on projects that improve water quality such as fencing, waste management, and riparian plantings.

Water pollution and storm water projects on prioritized lists under the Department of Ecology are targeted with nearly \$63 million in funding. This includes \$15.4 million in grants for water quality hardship projects; \$39.5 million for statewide storm water grants and storm water retrofit and LID competitive grants; and \$7.9 million for water pollution control state revolving fund loans.

### **Forest Health**

Approximately \$8.5 million is provided for forest treatments that benefit state trust lands in eastern Washington by reducing insect, disease and wildfire hazards. This also includes noxious weed abatement and precommercial thinning on state trust lands.

### **Projects Benefitting the Puget Sound**

Funding of approximately \$18.5 million is provided to the Department of Natural Resources for the Puget SoundCorps and other restoration projects benefitting the Puget Sound. This includes water quality and habitat protection and restoration projects that are primarily on public lands, creosote piling removal, derelict vessel removal, shoreline restoration, and urban forest restoration. Under the Puget SoundCorps program, the Department of Natural Resources contracts with the Department of Ecology for crews of youth and military veterans to implement a variety of restoration projects.

### **State Parks and Recreation Commission**

Almost \$10 million is provided for the State Parks and Recreation Commission. \$7 million is provided for new projects such as new cabins, comfort stations, shelters, and the Lake Sammamish Concession and Event Center. In addition, \$1 million is provided for new culverts, \$820,000 for deferred maintenance, and \$886,000 for trails.

### Walla Walla Veterans' Home

\$46 million is provided for a new veterans' skilled nursing center in Walla Walla. \$14 million is from state general obligation bonds and \$32 million is federally funded for the 82,000 square foot facility. The new facility will include eight 10-bed homes consisting of 80 beds, a community center, and other shared support spaces.

### **Local Government Infrastructure**

Fifty-eight local infrastructure projects on the Public Works Assistance Account FY 2013 Loan List are financed with an investment of \$152 million from the Account and a comparable amount of federal, state and local funding. These projects construct, rehabilitate, and improve sanitary sewer, domestic water, storm water management, and solid waste/recycling facilities and systems.

\$70 million is provided for an additional infrastructure funding round under the Public Works Board. While applicants and projects must meet the requirements of the existing statute, for this round only, the Public Works Board, rather than the Legislature, will determine the projects selected and amounts awarded.

\$15 million is provided for Community Economic Revitalization Board loans and grants to finance public infrastructure improvements that encourage new business development and expansion in areas seeking economic growth.

Over \$28 million is provided as grants to 14 communities statewide for high priority, ready-to-proceed drinking water projects that will benefit public health. Projects include water system consolidations, arsenic treatment, and facility repairs and upgrades.

### **Grants Benefitting Local Communities**

Nearly \$9 million is set aside under the Building Communities Fund program for an accelerated competitive round of grants for nonresidential community and social service centers. For this round only, state funds can be used for up to 75 percent of each project and the Department of Commerce, not the Legislature, will select the projects and funding amounts.

### **Low-Income Housing**

\$98 million is provided under the Housing Trust Fund (HTF) program to construct, rehabilitate, and improve housing for people who are low income and have chronic physical and mental illnesses, have developmental disabilities, are homeless with children, and are military veterans, seniors, or farmworkers. Historically, one dollar of HTF investment has generated five additional dollars from federal, private, and local sources.
