2 following:

3 "NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1.** (1) A capital budget is hereby adopted
4 and, subject to the provisions set forth in this act, the several
5 dollar amounts hereinafter specified, or so much thereof as shall be
6 sufficient to accomplish the purposes designated, are hereby
7 appropriated and authorized to be incurred for capital projects
8 during the period beginning with the effective date of this act and
9 ending June 30, 2017, out of the several funds specified in this act.

10 (2) The definitions in this subsection apply throughout this act
11 unless the context clearly requires otherwise.

12 (a) "Fiscal year 2016" or "FY 2016" means the period beginning
13 July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2016.

14 (b) "Fiscal year 2017" or "FY 2017" means the period beginning
15 July 1, 2016, and ending June 30, 2017.

16 (c) "Lapse" or "revert" means the amount shall return to an
17 unappropriated status.

18 (d) "Provided solely" means the specified amount may be spent
19 only for the specified purpose.

20 (3) Unless otherwise specifically authorized in this act, any
21 portion of an amount provided solely for a specified purpose that is
22 not expended subject to the specified conditions and limitations to
23 fulfill the specified purpose shall lapse.

24 (4) The amounts shown under the headings "Prior Biennia," "Future
25 Biennia," and "Total" in this act are for informational purposes only
26 and do not constitute legislative approval of these amounts. "Prior
27 biennia" typically refers to the immediate prior biennium for
28 reappropriations, but may refer to multiple biennia in the case of
29 specific projects. A "future biennia" amount is an estimate of what
30 may be appropriated for the project or program in the 2017-2019
31 biennium and the following three biennia; an amount of zero does not

1 necessarily constitute legislative intent to not provide funding for
2 the project or program in the future.

3 (5) "Reappropriations" in this act are appropriations and, unless
4 the context clearly provides otherwise, are subject to the relevant
5 conditions and limitations applicable to appropriations.
6 Reappropriations shall be limited to the unexpended balances
7 remaining on June 30, 2015, from the 2013-2015 biennial
8 appropriations for each project.

10 **GENERAL GOVERNMENT**

12 House of Representatives Interim Task Force on Washington Waters
13 (91000002)

14 (1) The house of representatives finds that low water supply in
15 portions of eastern Washington, catastrophic flood damage, and storm
16 water runoff polluting state waterways have reached crisis levels,
17 endangering the health and safety of our citizens and the
18 environment.

19 (2) The house of representatives interim task force on Washington
20 waters is established to build upon the foundation of Senate Bill No.
21 5628 that was introduced in the 2015 regular session and provided for
22 storm water, flood control, and water supply infrastructure in the
23 state. The objective of the task force is to prepare a report and
24 draft legislation for consideration in the 2016 legislative session
25 that:

26 (a) Quantifies the level of funding needed through fiscal year
27 2026 to address the three water priorities;

28 (b) Develops and recommends state funding options that address
29 the three water priorities equally;

30 (c) Develops and recommends local funding options that generate
31 revenues from municipal and agricultural beneficiaries;

32 (d) Develops and recommends criteria and mechanisms for managing,
33 prioritizing and distributing the funding;

34 (e) Analyzes and reports on the metrics and variables associated
35 with water market pricing, including the costs per acre-foot of water
36 supply developed and delivered for irrigation; and

1 (f) Addresses other relevant issues as determined by the task
2 force.

3 (3) The house of representatives interim task force on Washington
4 waters must consist of ten members:

5 (a) Five members from the majority caucus appointed by the
6 speaker of the house, including the chair of the capital budget
7 committee; one member each from the appropriations, finance, and
8 transportation committees; and one member at large; and

9 (b) Five members from the minority caucus appointed by the
10 minority leader, including the ranking minority member of the capital
11 budget committee; one member each from the appropriations, finance,
12 and transportation committees; and one member at large.

13 (c) The chair and the ranking minority member of the capital
14 budget committee shall cochair the task force.

15 (d) Appointments to the task force must be completed within
16 fifteen days of the effective date of this section.

17 (4) Principal staff support for the task force must be provided
18 by the house of representatives office of program research. The task
19 force may:

20 (a) Request the participation of the office of financial
21 management and other relevant executive branch agencies;

22 (b) Enter into contracts with persons who have specific technical
23 expertise; and

24 (c) Solicit information and perspectives from representatives of
25 public and private organizations.

26 (5) Legislative members of the task force must be reimbursed for
27 travel expenses in accordance with RCW 44.04.120. Task force
28 expenditures are subject to approval by the house of representatives
29 executive rules committee, or its successor committee.

30 (6) The task force must report its findings and recommendations
31 to appropriate legislative committees by November 15, 2015.

32 (7) The task force expires on June 30, 2016.

33 (8) The appropriation in this section is provided solely for any
34 technical research and analysis required to carry out the task force
35 objectives in subsection (2) of this section.

26 and monitoring projects under this section, the department must:

27 (a) Ensure that competitive bidding processes, rather than sole
28 source contracting processes, are used to select all projects;

29 (b) Require that all expenditures be used for projects that
30 develop and acquire asset that have a useful life of at least
31 thirteen years; and

32 (c) Conduct due diligence activities associated with the use of
33 public funds including, but not limited to, oversight of the project
34 selection process, project monitoring and ensuring that all
35 applications and contracts fully comply with all applicable laws
36 including disclosure and conflict of interest statutes.

1 (3)(a) Pursuant to chapter 42.52 RCW, the ethics in public
2 service act, the department must require an applicant to identify in
3 application materials any state of Washington employees or former
4 state employees employed or on the firm's governing board during the
5 past twenty-four months. Application materials must identify the
6 individual by name, the agency previously or currently employed by,
7 job title or position held, and separation date. If it is determined
8 by the department that a conflict of interest exists, the applicant
9 may be disqualified from further consideration for award of a
10 contract.

11 (b) If the department finds, after due notice and examination,
12 that there is a violation of chapter 42.52 RCW, or any similar
13 statute involving a contractor either in procuring or performing
14 under the contract, the department in its sole discretion may
15 terminate the contract by written notice. If the contract is
16 terminated, the department must be entitled to pursue the same
17 remedies against the contractor as it could pursue in the event of a
18 breach of the contract by the contractor.

19 (4) The requirements in subsections (2) and (3) of this section
20 must be specified in funding agreements issued by the department.

21 (5) The department may not obligate or expend any of the amounts
22 provided in this section on new projects that involve the Snohomish
23 county public utilities district or its subcontractors until the
24 executive ethics board responds to the department's June 17, 2015,
25 request for an advisory opinion on poststate employment.

26 (6)(a) \$10,000,000 of the state taxable building construction
27 account is provided solely to create a revolving loan fund to support
28 the widespread use of proven energy efficiency and renewable energy
29 technologies now inhibited by lack of access to capital.

30 (b) The department shall provide grant funds to one or more
31 competitively selected nonprofit lenders that will provide matching
32 private capital and will administer the loan fund. The department
33 must select the loan fund administrator or administrators through a
34 competitive process, with scoring conducted by a group of qualified
35 experts, applying criteria specified by the department.

36 (c) The department must establish guidelines that specify
37 applicant eligibility, the screening process, and evaluation and
38 selection criteria. The guidelines must be used by the nonprofit
39 lenders.

1 (d) Loan applications must disclose all sources of public funds
2 invested in the project. The nonprofit lender must make loans
3 available to the following types of projects that include, but are
4 not limited to: Residential, commercial, industrial, and agricultural
5 energy retrofits, residential and community-scale solar
6 installations, anaerobic digesters to treat dairy and organic waste,
7 and combined heat and power projects using woody biomass as a fuel
8 source.

9 (e) State funds may not exceed fifty percent of the estimated
10 cost of a project, and funding preference must be provided to
11 projects that offer a higher percentage of nonstate match funds.

12 (7) \$6,600,000 of the state taxable building construction account
13 is provided solely for credit enhancements of advanced solar and
14 renewable energy manufacturing within Washington state. The
15 department shall develop an application process to competitively
16 select projects.

17 (8)(a) \$13,000,000 of the state building construction account is
18 provided solely for grants to advance clean and renewable energy
19 technologies and advance transmission and distribution control system
20 improvements for increased reliability, resiliency, and enabling
21 integration of distributed and renewable resources and technology by
22 public and private electrical utilities that serve retail customers
23 in the state. Eligible utilities may partner with other public and
24 private sector research organizations and businesses in applying for
25 funding.

26 (b) The department shall develop a grant application process to
27 competitively select projects for grant awards, to include scoring
28 conducted by a group of qualified experts with application of
29 criteria specified by the department. In development of the
30 application criteria, the department shall, to the extent possible,
31 allow smaller utilities or consortia of small utilities to apply for
32 funding.

33 (c) The department shall convene an advisory panel of electric
34 utility representatives to identify program objectives, near term
35 priorities and long term goals.

36 (d) Applications for grants must disclose all sources of public
37 funds invested in a project.

38 (e) Grant funds must be used for research, development, or
39 demonstration projects that integrate intermittent renewables through
40 energy storage, information technology or other smart grid

1 technologies, dispatch energy storage resources from utility control
2 rooms, use demand response, transactive control, or the thermal
3 properties and electric load of commercial buildings and district
4 energy systems to store energy, reduce transmission congestion or

2 **MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS**

3 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 7001.** RCW 43.88.031 requires the disclosure
4 of the estimated debt service costs associated with new capital bond
5 appropriations. The estimated debt service costs for the
6 appropriations contained in this act are thirty-six million eight
7 hundred thirteen thousand dollars for the 2015-2017 biennium, two
8 hundred thirty-three million two hundred eighty-six thousand dollars
9 for the 2017-2019 biennium, and three hundred twenty-seven million
10 two hundred thirty-four thousand dollars for the 2019-2021 biennium.

11 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 7002.** ACQUISITION OF PROPERTIES AND
12 FACILITIES THROUGH FINANCIAL CONTRACTS. (1) The following agencies
13 may enter into financial contracts, paid from any funds of an agency,
14 appropriated or nonappropriated, for the purposes indicated and in

24 ready to proceed in a timely manner depending on the type or phase of
25 the project or program that is the subject of the appropriation in
26 this act. Except for major projects that customarily may take more
27 than two biennia to complete from predesign to the end of
28 construction, or large infrastructure grant or loan programs
29 supporting projects that often take more than two biennia to
30 complete, the legislature generally does not intend to reappropriate
31 funds more than once, particularly for smaller grant programs, local/
32 community projects, and minor works.

33 (2) Agencies shall expedite the expenditure of reappropriations
34 and appropriations in this act in order to: (a) Rehabilitate
35 infrastructure resources; (b) accelerate environmental rehabilitation
36 and restoration projects for the improvement of the state's natural
37 environment; (c) reduce additional costs associated with acquisition
38 and construction inflationary pressures; and (d) provide additional
39 employment opportunities associated with capital expenditures.

1 (3) To the extent feasible, agencies are directed to accelerate
2 expenditure rates at their current level of permanent employees and
3 shall use contracted design and construction services wherever
4 necessary to meet the goals of this section.

5 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 7008.** (1) Any building project that receives
6 over \$10,000,000 in funding from the capital budget must be built to
7 sustainable standards. "Sustainable building" means a building that
8 integrates and optimizes all major high-performance building
9 attributes, including energy efficiency, durability, life-cycle
10 performance, and occupant productivity. The following design and
11 construction attributes must be integrated into the building project:

12 (a) Employ integrated design principles: Use a collaborative,
13 integrated planning and design process that initiates and maintains
14 an integrated project team in all stages of a project's planning and
15 delivery. Establish performance goals for siting, energy, water,
16 materials, and indoor environmental quality along with other
17 comprehensive design goals and ensures incorporation of these goals
18 throughout the design and life-cycle of the building. Considers all
19 stages of the building's life-cycle, including deconstruction.

20 (b) Commissioning: Employ commissioning practices tailored to the
21 size and complexity of the building and its system components in
22 order to verify performance of building components and systems and
23 help ensure that design requirements are met. This should include an
24 experienced commissioning provider, inclusion of commissioning
25 requirements in construction documents, a commissioning plan,
26 verification of the installation and performance of systems to be
27 commissioned, and a commissioning report.

28 (c) Optimize energy performance: Establish a whole building
29 performance target that takes into account the intended use,
30 occupancy, operations, plug loads, other energy demands, and design
31 to earn the ENERGY STAR targets for new construction and major
32 renovation where applicable. For new construction target low energy
33 use index. For major renovations, reduce the energy use by fifty
34 percent below pre-renovations baseline.

35 (d) On-site renewable energy: Meet at least thirty percent of the
36 hot water demand through the installation of solar hot water heaters,
37 when life-cycle cost effective. Implement renewable energy generation
38 projects on agency property for agency use, when life-cycle cost
39 effective.

1 (e) Measurement and verification: Install building level
2 electricity meters in new major construction and renovation projects
3 to track and continuously optimize performance. Include equivalent
4 meters for natural gas and steam, where natural gas and steam are
5 used. Install dashboards inside buildings to display and incentivize
6 occupants on energy use.

7 (f) Benchmarking: Compare actual performance data from the first
8 year of operation with the energy design target. Verify that the
9 building performance meets or exceeds the design target. For other
10 building and space types, use an equivalent benchmarking tool for
11 laboratory buildings. Web-based data collection and dashboards must
12 also be provided.

13 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 7009.** State agencies, including institutions
14 of higher education, shall allot and report full-time equivalent
15 staff for capital projects in a manner comparable to staff reporting
16 for operating expenditures.

17 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 7010.** Executive Order No. 05-05,
18 archaeological and cultural resources, was issued effective November
19 10, 2005. Agencies and higher education institutions shall comply
20 with the requirements set forth in this executive order.

21 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 7011.** PUGET SOUND PROTECTION AND RESTORATION.
22 Consistent with RCW 90.71.340, when expending appropriations under
23 this act that contribute to Puget Sound protection and recovery,
24 agencies shall consult with the Puget Sound partnership to ensure
25 that projects and expenditures are either in, or consistent with the
26 2020 action agenda. These consultations shall include the exchange of
27 information on specific actions, projects, associated funding,
28 performance measures, and other information necessary to track
29 project implementation and ensure alignment with the action agenda.
30 In situations where the Puget Sound partnership finds that a project
31 is not in, or is not consistent with the action agenda, Puget Sound
32 partnership shall document this finding and report back to the
33 governor and legislative fiscal committees.

34 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 7012.** FOR THE ARTS COMMISSION—ART WORK
35 ALLOWANCE. (1) One-half of one percent of moneys appropriated in this

1 act for original construction of school plant facilities is provided
2 solely for the purposes of RCW 28A.335.210.

3 (2) One-half of one percent of moneys appropriated in this act
4 for original construction or any major renovation or remodel work
5 exceeding \$200,000 by colleges or universities is provided solely for
6 the purposes of RCW 28B.10.027.

7 (3) One-half of one percent of moneys appropriated in this act
8 for original construction of any public building by a state agency
9 identified in RCW 43.17.020 is provided solely for the purposes of
10 RCW 43.17.200.

11 (4) At least eighty-five percent of the moneys spent by the
12 Washington state arts commission during the 2015-2017 biennium for
13 the purposes of RCW 28A.335.210, 28B.10.027, and 43.17.200 must be
14 expended solely for direct acquisition of works of art. Art
15 allocations not expended within the ensuing two biennia will lapse.
16 The commission may use up to \$100,000 of this amount to conserve or
17 maintain existing pieces in the state art collection pursuant to RCW
18 28A.335.210.

19 (5) The executive director of the arts commission shall appoint a
20 study group to review the operations of the one-half of one percent
21 for works of art purchased or commissioned as required by RCW
22 28A.335.210, 28B.10.027, and 43.17.200. The findings of the review
23 must be reported annually to the office of financial management and
24 the fiscal committees of the legislature by August 15th. The review
25 must include, but is not limited to, the following: (a) Projects
26 purchased or commissioned per biennium; (b) partner agencies; (c)
27 funding sources by fiscal year; (d) artwork costs; (e) administrative
28 costs; (f) collection care costs; and (g) project status.

29 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 7013.** It is confirmed that the director of
30 the department of enterprise services is authorized under chapter
31 35A.14 RCW to petition for annexation of the former northern state
32 hospital property to the city of Sedro-Woolley upon the director's
33 determination that such annexation is appropriate and in furtherance
34 of the interests of the state. The director shall consult with the
35 office of financial management prior to making such determination.

36 **Sec. 7014.** RCW 27.34.330 and 2006 c 371 s 232 are each amended
37 to read as follows:

1 The Washington state historical society shall establish a
2 competitive process to solicit proposals for and prioritize heritage
3 capital projects for potential funding in the state capital budget.
4 The society shall adopt rules governing project eligibility and
5 evaluation criteria. Application for funding of specific projects may
6 be made to the society by local governments, public development
7 authorities, nonprofit corporations, tribal governments, and other
8 entities, as determined by the society. The society, with the advice
9 of leaders in the heritage field, including but not limited to
10 representatives from the office of the secretary of state, the
11 eastern Washington state historical society, and the department of
12 archaeology and historic preservation, shall establish and submit a
13 prioritized list of heritage capital projects to the governor and the
14 legislature in the society's biennial capital budget request. The
15 list shall include a description of each project, the amount of
16 recommended state funding, and documentation of nonstate funds to be
17 used for the project. The total amount of recommended state funding
18 for projects on a biennial project list shall not exceed ten million
19 dollars. The prioritized list shall be developed through open and
20 public meetings and the amount of state funding shall not exceed
21 thirty-three and thirty-three one hundredths percent of the total
22 cost of the project. The nonstate portion of the total project cost
23 may include cash, the value of real property when acquired solely for
24 the purpose of the project, and in-kind contributions. The department
25 shall not sign contracts or otherwise financially obligate funds
26 under this section until the legislature has approved a specific list
27 of projects. In contracts for grants authorized under this section,
28 the society shall include provisions requiring that capital
29 improvements be held by the grantee for a specified period of time
30 appropriate to the amount of the grant and that facilities be used
31 for the express purpose of the grant. If the grantee is found to be
32 out of compliance with provisions of the contract, the grantee shall
33 repay to the state general fund the principal amount of the grant
34 plus interest calculated at the rate of interest on state of
35 Washington general obligation bonds issued most closely to the date
36 of authorization of the grant.

37 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 7015.** To carry out the provisions of this
38 act, the governor may assign responsibility for predesign, design,
39 construction, and other related activities to any appropriate agency.

1 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 7016.** If any federal moneys appropriated by
2 this act for capital projects are not received by the state, the
3 department or agency to which the moneys were appropriated may
4 replace the federal moneys with funds available from private or local
5 sources. No replacement may occur under this section without the
6 prior approval of the director of financial management in
7 consultation with the senate ways and means committee and the house
8 of representatives capital budget committee.

9 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 7017.** (1) Unless otherwise stated, for all
10 appropriations under this act that require a match of nonstate money
11 or in-kind contributions, the following requirement, consistent with
12 RCW 43.88.150, shall apply: Expenditures of state money shall be
13 timed so that the state share of project expenditures never exceeds
14 the intended state share of total project costs.

15 (2) Provision of the full amount of required matching funds is
16 not required to permit the expenditure of capital budget
17 appropriations for phased projects if a proportional amount of the
18 required matching funds is provided for each distinct, identifiable
19 phase of the project.

20 **Sec. 7018.** RCW 28A.525.166 and 2013 2nd sp.s. c 18 s 514 are
21 each amended to read as follows:

22 Allocations to school districts of state funds provided by RCW
23 28A.525.162 through 28A.525.180 shall be made by the superintendent
24 of public instruction and the amount of state funding assistance to a
25 school district in financing a school plant project shall be
26 determined in the following manner:

27 (1) The boards of directors of the districts shall determine the
28 total cost of the proposed project, which cost may include the cost
29 of acquiring and preparing the site, the cost of constructing the
30 building or of acquiring a building and preparing the same for school
31 use, the cost of necessary equipment, taxes chargeable to the
32 project, necessary architects' fees, and a reasonable amount for
33 contingencies and for other necessary incidental expenses: PROVIDED,
34 That the total cost of the project shall be subject to review and
35 approval by the superintendent.

36 (2) The state funding assistance percentage for a school district
37 shall be computed by the following formula:

1 The ratio of the school district's adjusted valuation per pupil
 2 divided by the ratio of the total state adjusted valuation per pupil
 3 shall be subtracted from three, and then the result of the foregoing
 4 shall be divided by three plus (the ratio of the school district's
 5 adjusted valuation per pupil divided by the ratio of the total state
 6 adjusted valuation per pupil).

14 PROVIDED, That in the event the state funding assistance percentage
 15 to any school district based on the above formula is less than twenty
 16 percent and such school district is otherwise eligible for state
 17 funding assistance under RCW 28A.525.162 through 28A.525.180, the
 18 superintendent may establish for such district a state funding
 19 assistance percentage not in excess of twenty percent of the approved
 20 cost of the project, if the superintendent finds that such additional
 21 assistance is necessary to provide minimum facilities for housing the
 22 pupils of the district.

23 (3) In addition to the computed state funding assistance
 24 percentage developed in subsection (2) of this section, a school
 25 district shall be entitled to additional percentage points determined
 26 by the average percentage of growth for the past three years. One
 27 percent shall be added to the computed state funding assistance
 28 percentage for each percent of growth, with a maximum of twenty
 29 percent.

30 (4) In computing the state funding assistance percentage in
 31 subsection (2) of this section and adjusting the percentage under
 32 subsection (3) of this section, students residing outside the school
 33 district who are enrolled in alternative learning experience courses
 34 under RCW 28A.232.010 shall be excluded from the count of total
 35 pupils. In lieu of the exclusion in this subsection, a district may
 36 submit an alternative calculation for excluding students enrolled in
 37 alternative learning experience courses. The alternative calculation
 38 must show the student headcount use of district classroom facilities

1 on a regular basis for a reasonable duration by out-of-district
2 alternative learning experience students subtracted by the headcount
3 of in-district alternative learning experience students not using
4 district classroom facilities on a regular basis for a reasonable
5 duration. The alternative calculation must be submitted in a form
6 approved by the office of the superintendent of public instruction.
7 The office of the superintendent of public instruction must develop
8 rules to define "regular basis" and "reasonable duration."

9 (5) The approved cost of the project determined in the manner
10 prescribed in this section multiplied by the state funding assistance
11 percentage derived as provided for in this section shall be the
12 amount of state funding assistance to the district for the financing
13 of the project: PROVIDED, That need therefor has been established to
14 the satisfaction of the superintendent: PROVIDED, FURTHER, That
15 additional state funding assistance may be allowed if it is found by
16 the superintendent, considering policy recommendations from the
17 school facilities citizen advisory panel that such assistance is
18 necessary in order to meet (a) a school housing emergency resulting
19 from the destruction of a school building by fire, the condemnation
20 of a school building by properly constituted authorities, a sudden
21 excessive and clearly foreseeable future increase in school
22 population, or other conditions similarly emergent in nature; or (b)
23 a special school housing burden resulting from projects of statewide
24 significance or imposed by virtue of the admission of nonresident
25 students into educational programs established, maintained and
26 operated in conformity with the requirements of law; or (c) a
27 deficiency in the capital funds of the district resulting from
28 financing, subsequent to April 1, 1969, and without benefit of the
29 state funding assistance provided by prior state assistance programs,
30 the construction of a needed school building project or projects
31 approved in conformity with the requirements of such programs, after
32 having first applied for and been denied state funding assistance
33 because of the inadequacy of state funds available for the purpose,
34 or (d) a condition created by the fact that an excessive number of
35 students live in state owned housing, or (e) a need for the
36 construction of a school building to provide for improved school
37 district organization or racial balance, or (f) conditions similar to
38 those defined under (a), (b), (c), (d), and (e) of this subsection,
39 creating a like emergency.

1 (6) For the 2015-2017 biennium, schools determined to have a lack
2 of sufficient space to provide science classrooms or labs, to meet
3 the requirements of law, have a special housing burden condition
4 similar to those defined under subsection (5)(b) of this section,
5 creating a like emergency. For the 2015-2017 biennium, school
6 districts are entitled to additional percentage points for school
7 construction projects that have a special housing burden condition
8 only and have received private donations in the form of cash, in-
9 kind, or equipment of more than one hundred thousand dollars. The
10 additional percentage points are determined by (a) school district
11 student enrollments in the free and reduced-price meals program, (b)
12 school district class as defined by RCW 28A.300.065, and (c) the
13 funding assistance percentage as calculated in subsection (2) of this
14 section. The additional percentage points under (a) of this
15 subsection are twenty percent of the percent of student enrollments
16 eligible and enrolled in the free and reduced-price meals program.
17 The additional percentage points under (b) of this subsection are ten
18 for second class school districts. The additional percentage points
19 under (c) of this subsection are ten for school districts with
20 funding assistance percentages of more than fifty percent.

21 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 7019.** STATE TREASURER REPORT ON SHORT-TERM
22 BOND FINANCING. By December 1, 2015, the office of the state
23 treasurer must prepare a report to the Legislature on all various
24 purpose general obligation bond issuances for capital projects from
25 2005 through 2015. The report must:

- 26 (1) Categorize the bond issuances in terms of final maturities;
27 (2) Explain the current practice of repaying debt in equal debt
28 service installments over a twenty-five-year period, regardless of
29 the useful life of the specific projects or properties being
30 financed; and
31 (3) Recommend a pilot approach to short-term bond financing that
32 matches final maturities with the useful life of specific projects or
33 properties being financed.

34 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 7020.** NONTAXABLE AND TAXABLE BOND PROCEEDS.
35 Portions of the appropriation authority granted by this act from the
36 state building construction account, or any other account receiving
37 bond proceeds, may be transferred to the state taxable building
38 construction account as deemed necessary by the state finance

1 committee to comply with the federal internal revenue service rules
2 and regulations pertaining to the use of nontaxable bond proceeds.
3 Portions of the general obligation bond proceeds authorized by
4 chapter . . . , Laws of 2015 3rd sp. sess. (Engrossed House Bill No.
5 1166, the general obligation bond bill) for deposit into the state
6 taxable building construction account that are in excess of amounts
7 required to comply with the federal internal revenue service rules
8 and regulations shall be deposited into the state building
9 construction account. The state treasurer shall submit written
10 notification to the director of financial management if it is
11 determined that a shift of appropriation authority between the state
12 building construction account, or any other account receiving bond
13 proceeds, and the state taxable building construction account is
14 necessary, or that a shift of appropriation authority from the state
15 taxable building construction account to the state building
16 construction account may be made.

17 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 7021.** COLUMBIA RIVER BASIN NONTAXABLE AND
18 TAXABLE BOND PROCEEDS. Portions of the appropriation authority
19 granted by this act from the Columbia river basin water supply
20 development account may be transferred to the Columbia river basin
21 taxable bond water supply development account as deemed necessary by
22 the state finance committee to comply with the federal internal
23 revenue service rules and regulations pertaining to the use of
24 nontaxable bond proceeds. The state treasurer shall submit written
25 notification to the director of financial management if it is
26 determined that a shift of appropriation authority between the
27 Columbia river basin water supply development account and the
28 Columbia river basin taxable bond water supply development account is
29 necessary, or that a shift of appropriation authority from the
30 Columbia river basin taxable bond water supply development account to
31 the Columbia river basin water supply development account may be
32 made.

33 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 7022.** The office of financial management, in
34 consultation with the fiscal committees of the legislature, may
35 select capital projects that have completed predesign to undergo a
36 budget evaluation study. The budget evaluation study team approach
37 using value engineering techniques and life cycle cost analysis must
38 be utilized by the office of financial management in conducting the

1 studies. The office of financial management shall select the budget
2 evaluation team members, contract for the study, and report the
3 results to the legislature and agencies in a timely manner following
4 the study. Funds from the project appropriation must be used by the
5 office of financial management through an interagency agreement with
6 the affected agencies to cover the cost of the study.

7 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 7023.** JLARC WWRP & STATE LAND ACQUISITION
8 STUDY. (1) The joint legislative audit and review committee must
9 conduct a review of state and local efforts to protect and conserve
10 habitat and expand outdoor recreation since 1990.

11 (2) The review has two objectives:

12 (a) To determine what existing or potential objective outcome
13 measures can be used to evaluate the success of major regulatory
14 programs or state expenditures that are intended to protect and
15 conserve habitat and expand outdoor recreation; and

16 (b) To compare the amount of habitat lands protected through
17 acquisitions and easements with the amount of lands protected through
18 the major regulatory programs within three counties west of the
19 cascades and three counties east of the cascades.

20 (3) The review must include state expenditures and local and
21 federal expenditures used to match state funding in the following
22 programs:

23 (a) Salmon recovery funding board expenditures;

24 (b) Puget Sound acquisition and restoration;

25 (c) Puget Sound estuary and salmon restoration;

26 (d) The Washington wildlife and recreation program;

27 (e) State parks and recreation commission expenditures that
28 expand recreational lands and facilities;

29 (f) Trust land transfer program and other expenditures by the
30 department of natural resources that protect habitat or expand
31 recreation; and

32 (g) Other state expenditures that expand recreational lands and
33 facilities.

34 (3) The review must also include the following regulatory
35 programs:

36 (a) Growth management regulations regarding critical areas;

37 (b) Wetland restrictions;

38 (c) Shoreline management rules;

39 (d) Forest practices regulation; and

1 (e) Hydraulic project approval program.

2 (4) The review must identify other objective benefits provided by
3 each of the included programs, such as public safety, habitat
4 protection, environmental quality, public health, protection of
5 infrastructure, and economic development.

6 (5) The review must also examine a sample of recreation and
7 habitat land acquisition by state agencies within the past ten years
8 to determine whether the state agencies have a land stewardship
9 program for the land parcels, what that program entails, and the
10 extent of compliance with that program. Land stewardship includes,
11 but is not limited to, restoring or developing the land to meet the
12 objectives of the acquisition, suppressing invasive weeds, securing
13 the property to prevent damage, and maintaining the land to prevent
14 wildfires.

15 (6) In undertaking the review, the joint legislative audit and
16 review committee may contract with experts in measuring the outcomes
17 of regulatory and funding programs to protect and conserve habitat.

18 (7) By December 1, 2016, the joint legislative audit and review
19 committee must submit a report to the appropriate committees of the
20 senate and the house of representatives that presents information and
21 findings from the study. The report is to include recommendations for
22 accountability measures for determining the achievement of intended
23 outcomes for protecting, acquiring, and improving habitat and
24 recreation lands and facilities.

25 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 7024.** SCHOOL SITING TASK FORCE. (1) The
26 legislature recognizes that school districts are responsible for
27 siting, building, and maintaining school facilities that provide a
28 learning environment supportive of student achievement, and that
29 schools are integral to the communities they serve. The legislature
30 intends to create the legislative task force on school siting, as
31 provided in subsection (2) of this section, to review school facility
32 challenges created by enrollment increases and recent education
33 reforms, including expansion of full-day kindergarten and smaller
34 class sizes.

35 (2) A legislative task force on school siting is established,
36 with members as provided in this subsection. All member appointments
37 or selections must be made by August 1, 2015.

1 (a) The president of the senate shall appoint as members, the
2 chairs and ranking members of the committees on government operations
3 and security and the committee on early learning and K-12 education.

4 (b) The speaker of the house of representatives shall appoint as
5 members, the chairs and ranking members of the committees on local
6 government and education.

7 (c) The governor shall appoint one member who represents
8 environmental concerns related to school siting, one member who
9 represents active transportation concerns, and one member who
10 represents the building industry.

11 (d) The task force must also include:

12 (i) A representative of the association of Washington cities;

13 (ii) A representative of the Washington state association of
14 counties;

15 (iii) Two representatives of school districts, who represent
16 school districts that serve students in urban areas and currently are
17 experiencing difficulty finding suitable siting locations, selected
18 by the Washington association of school administrators;

19 (iv) Two representatives of school districts, who represent
20 school districts that serve students in rural areas and currently are
21 experiencing difficulty finding suitable siting locations, selected
22 by the Washington association of school administrators; and

23 (v) A representative of the Washington state association of
24 county and regional planning directors.

25 (3) The task force shall choose its chair from among its
26 legislative membership.

27 (4) The task force shall review the issue of siting schools
28 inside and outside of urban growth areas. In reviewing this issue,
29 the task force must achieve the planning goals and requirements set
30 forth in chapter 36.70A RCW, the needs of school districts facing
31 capacity issues, and the infrastructure needs of local governments.
32 The task force shall also consider the following:

33 (a) A comparison of providing transportation to and from schools
34 in urban and rural areas;

35 (b) The impacts of schools on local and regional plans for growth
36 when they are constructed in urban and rural areas;

37 (c) The availability and cost of water, sewer, transportation,
38 law enforcement, emergency response facilities and services, and
39 other necessary public facilities and services in urban and rural
40 areas; and

1 (d) Identify school locations that provide the most financially
2 sustainable facilities and make the most efficient use of total tax
3 dollars for each impacted jurisdiction, including school districts,
4 cities, county unincorporated areas, sewer/water districts, fire
5 districts, and the state;

6 (5) Staff from the office of the superintendent of public
7 instruction and from affected school districts, counties, and cities
8 must support the task force by providing local information as needed.
9 Support provided by staff from the office of the superintendent of
10 public instruction must be provided within existing resources.

11 (6) Staff support for the task force must be provided within
12 existing resources by the association of Washington cities, the
13 Washington state association of counties, the Washington association
14 of school administrators, and the Washington state association of
15 county and regional planning directors.

16 (7) Legislative members of the task force must be reimbursed for
17 travel expenses in accordance with RCW 44.04.120. Nonlegislative
18 members, except those representing an employer or organization, are

18 submitting the lowest responsive bid.

19 (7) The university shall make an effort to solicit proposals from
20 certified minority or certified woman-owned contractors to the extent
21 permitted by the Washington state civil rights act, RCW 49.60.400.

22 (8) Beginning in September 2010 and every other (~~year~~)
23 September thereafter, the university shall provide a report to the
24 capital projects advisory review board which must, at a minimum,
25 include a list of rosters used, contracts awarded, and a description
26 of outreach to and participation by women and minority-owned
27 businesses.

28 (9) Beginning in September 2015 and every September thereafter,
29 the university shall report to the office of minority and women's
30 business enterprises and to the appropriate legislative fiscal
31 committees the number of qualified women and minority-owned business
32 contractors on the roster or rosters and the number of contracts

34 NEW SECTION. Sec. 7044. (1) The office of financial management
35 shall develop a master plan for museums and research facilities to

38 research materials, DNA tissue samples, tribal artifacts, and other
39 related items of an historical nature.

1 (2) The office of financial management shall identify the
2 following: (a) Types of space needed to store, research, and display
3 items and collections depending on types of items; (b) an inventory
4 of existing spaces that the state may utilize to fill storage,
5 research, and display needs; (c) recommendations regarding the
6 highest and best use of the capital museum in Olympia; (d)

18 burke museum; (d) the eastern Washington state historical society;
19 and (e) other entities as necessary.

20 (4) The office of financial management must present the statewide
21 museum master plan to the appropriate committees of the legislature
22 by December 31, 2015.

23 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 7045.** This act is necessary for the immediate
