16 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

17 A supplemental capital budget is hereby NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. adopted and, subject to the provisions set forth in this act, the 18 several dollar amounts hereinafter specified, or so much thereof as 19 20 shall be sufficient to accomplish the purposes designated, are hereby 21 appropriated and authorized to be incurred for capital projects Code Rev/AF:lel 1 S-5385.2/18 2nd draft

during the period beginning with the effective date of this act and
 ending June 30, 2019, out of the several funds specified in this act.

#### PART 1

#### GENERAL GOVERNMENT

5 **Sec. 1001.** 2018 c 2 s 1006 (uncodified) is amended to read as 6 follows:

#### 7 FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE

8 2017-19 Housing Trust Fund Program (30000872)

9 The appropriations in this section are subject to the following 10 conditions and limitations:

(1) \$58,000,000 of the state taxable building construction account—state appropriation, \$43,400,000 of the state building construction account—state appropriation, and \$5,370,000 of the Washington housing trust account—state appropriation are provided solely for affordable housing and preservation of affordable housing. Of the amounts in this subsection:

(a) \$24,370,000 is provided solely for housing projects that provide supportive housing and case-management services to persons with chronic mental illness. The department must prioritize lowincome supportive housing unit proposals that provide services or include a partner community behavioral health treatment provider;

22 (b) \$10,000,000 is provided solely for housing preservation grants or loans to be awarded competitively. The grants may be 23 24 provided for major building improvements, preservation, and system 25 replacements, necessary for the existing housing trust fund portfolio 26 to maintain long-term viability. The department must require that a capital needs assessment is performed to estimate the cost of the 27 preservation project at contract execution. Funds may not be used to 28 29 add or expand the capacity of the property. To receive grants, housing projects must meet the following requirements: 30

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(i) The property is more than fifteen years old;

32 (ii) At least 50 percent of the housing units are occupied by33 families and individuals at or below 30 percent area median income.

34 (iii) The improvements will result in reduction of operating or 35 utilities costs, or both; and

36 (iv) Other criteria that the department considers necessary to 37 achieve the purpose of this program.

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1 (c) \$5,000,000 is provided solely for housing projects that 2 benefit people at or below 80 percent of the area median income who 3 have been displaced by a natural disaster declared by the governor, 4 including people who have been displaced within the last two biennia.

(d) \$1,000,000 of the Washington housing trust account-state 5 appropriation is provided solely for the department to work with the б 7 communities of concern commission to focus on creating capital assets that will help reduce poverty and build stronger and more sustainable 8 communities using the communities' cultural understanding and vision. 9 10 funding must be used for predevelopment costs for capital The projects identified by the commission and for other activities to 11 12 assist communities in developing capacity to create community-owned 13 capital assets.

(e) \$1,000,000 of the Washington housing trust account—state appropriation is provided solely for a nonprofit, public development authority, local government, or housing authority to purchase the south annex properties located at 1531 Broadway, 1534 Broadway, and 909 Pine street owned by the state board of community and technical colleges. The property must be used to provide services and housing for homeless youth.

21 (f) \$21,987,000 is provided solely for the following list of 22 housing projects:

23 (i) Cross Laminated Timber Spokane Housing Predesign. . \$500,000 24 25 (iii) Highland Village Preservation. . . . . . . . . \$1,500,000 (iv) King County Modular Housing Project. . . . . . \$3,000,000 26 27 28 (vi) Othello Homesight Community Center. . . . . . \$3,000,000 29 (vii) \$6,000,000 is provided solely for grants for high quality low-income housing projects that will quickly move people from 30 31 homelessness into secure housing, and are significantly less expensive to construct than traditional housing. It is the intent of 32 the legislature that these grants serve projects with a total project 33 34 development cost per housing unit of less than \$125,000, excluding the value of land, and with a commitment by the applicant to maintain 35 the housing units for at least a twenty-five year period. Amounts 36 provided that are subject to this subsection must be used to plan, 37 predesign, design, provide technical assistance and financial 38 services, purchase land for, and build innovative low-income housing 39 40 units. \$3,000,000 of the appropriation that is subject to this Code Rev/AF:lel S-5385.2/18 2nd draft 3

1 subsection is provided solely for innovative affordable housing in Shelton and \$3,000,000 of the appropriation that is subject to this 2 subsection is provided solely for innovative affordable housing for 3 veterans in Orting. Mental health and substance abuse counseling 4 services must be offered to residents of housing projects supported 5 6 by appropriations in this subsection. <u>\$500,000 of the appropriation</u> 7 for housing units in Shelton can be released for purchase of land, planning, or predesign services before the project is fully funded. 8 \$500,000 of the appropriation for housing units in Orting can be 9 released for purchase of land, planning, or predesign services before 10 the project is fully funded. 11

(viii) \$6,000,000 is provided solely for grants to the following organizations using innovative methods to address homelessness: \$3,000,000 for THA Arlington drive youth campus in Tacoma ((and \$3,000,000)), \$1,500,000 for Valley Cities modular housing project in Auburn, and \$1,500,000 for a King county housing project.

17 (g) Of the amounts appropriated remaining after (a) through (f) 18 of this subsection, the department must allocate the funds as 19 follows:

20 (i) 10 percent is provided solely for housing projects that 21 benefit veterans;

(ii) 10 percent is provided solely for housing projects thatbenefit homeownership;

(iii) 5 percent is provided solely for housing projects thatbenefit people with developmental disabilities;

(iv) The remaining amount is provided solely for projects that
serve low-income and special needs populations in need of housing,
including, but not limited to, homeless families with children,
homeless youth, farmworkers, and seniors.

30 (2) In evaluating projects in this section, the department must 31 give preference for applications based on some or all of the criteria 32 in RCW 43.185.070(5).

(3) The department must strive to allocate all of the amounts 33 appropriated in this section within the 2017-2019 fiscal biennium in 34 the manner prescribed in subsection (1) of this section. However, if 35 36 upon review of applications the department determines there are not adequate suitable projects in a category, the department may allocate 37 funds to projects serving other low-income and special needs 38 populations, provided those projects are located in an area with an 39 identified need for the type of housing proposed. 40

12 follows:

#### 13 FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE

14 2018 Local and Community Projects (40000005)

The appropriations in this section are subject to the following conditions and limitations:

(1) The department shall not expend the appropriations in this section unless and until the nonstate share of project costs have been either expended or firmly committed, or both, in an amount sufficient to complete the project or a distinct phase of the project that is useable to the public for the purpose intended by the legislature. This requirement does not apply to projects where a share of the appropriation is for design costs only.

(2) Prior to receiving funds, project recipients must demonstrate that the project site is under control for a minimum of ten years, either through ownership or a long-term lease. This requirement does not apply to appropriations for preconstruction activities or appropriations in which the sole purpose is to purchase real property that does not include a construction or renovation component.

30 (3) Projects funded in this section may be required to comply 31 with Washington's high performance building standards as required by 32 chapter 39.35D RCW.

33 (4) Project funds are available on a reimbursement basis only,34 and shall not be advanced under any circumstances.

35 (5) In contracts for grants authorized under this section the 36 department shall include provisions which require that capital 37 improvements be held by the grantee for a specified period of time

appropriate to the amount of the grant and that facilities be used for the express purpose of the grant. If the grantee is found to be out of compliance with provisions of the contract, the grantee shall repay to the state general fund the principal amount of the grant plus interest calculated at the rate of interest on state of Washington general obligation bonds issued most closely to the date of authorization of the grant.

8 (6) Projects funded in this section, including those that are 9 owned and operated by nonprofit organizations, are generally required 10 to pay state prevailing wages.

14 (8) \$26,000 of the appropriation in this section is provided 15 solely for implementation of the Spanaway lake management plan, 16 contingent on commitment of local funding to support the on-going 17 operational costs of the project, including but not limited to the 18 creation of a lake management district.

(9) \$250,000 of the appropriation in this section is provided solely for the planning, development, acquisition, and other activities pursing open space conservation strategies for the historic Federal Way Weyerhaeuser campus. The grant recipient must be a regional nonprofit nature conservancy that works to conserve keystone properties selected by the city of Federal Way.

25 (10)(a) \$900,000 of the appropriation in this section is provided solely for an Interbay public development advisory committee. It is 26 the intent of the legislature to examine current and future needs of 27 a state entity that performs an essential public function on state-28 29 owned property located in one of the state's designated manufacturing industrial centers. The legislature further intends to explore the 30 potential future uses of this state-owned property in the event that 31 the state entity determines that it must relocate in order to protect 32 its ability to perform its essential public function. 33

(b) The Interbay public development advisory committee is created to make recommendations regarding the highest public benefit and future economic development uses for the Washington army national guard armory facility in the city of Seattle, pier 91 property, located at the descriptions referred to in the quit claim deeds for

1 two parcels of land, 24.75 acres total, dated January 8, 1971, and 2 December 22, 2009.

3 (c) The Interbay advisory committee consists of seven persons4 appointed as follows:

5 (i) One person appointed by the speaker of the house of 6 representatives;

7

(ii) One person appointed by the president of the senate; and

(iii) Five persons appointed by the governor, 8 who must collectively have experience in forming public-private partnerships 9 to develop workforce housing or affordable housing; knowledge of 10 project financing options for public-private partnerships related to 11 housing; architectural design and development experience related to 12 industrial lands and mixed-use zoning to include housing; and 13 14 experience leading public processes to engage communities and other stakeholders in public discussions regarding economic development 15 16 decisions.

(d) The Interbay public development advisory committee must:

18 (i) Work in collaboration with the military department to 19 determine the needs of the military department if it is relocated 20 from the land described in subsection (1) of this section, including 21 identifying:

22 (A) Current uses;

23 (B) Future needs of the units currently at this location;

(C) Potential suitable publicly owned sites in Washington forrelocation of current units; and

26 (D) The costs associated with acquisition, construction, and 27 relocation to another site or sites for these units;

(ii) Explore the future economic development opportunities if the
 land described in subsection (1) of this section is vacated by the
 military department, and make recommendations, including identifying:

(A) Suitable and unsuitable future uses for the land;

(B) Environmental issues and associated costs;

33 (C) Current public infrastructure availability, future public 34 infrastructure plans by local or regional entities, and potential 35 public infrastructure needs;

Expenditures 26 made by an agency for one of the indicated purposes before the issue 27 date of the authorized financial contract and any certificates of 28 29 participation therein are intended to be reimbursed from proceeds of the financial contract and any certificates of participation therein 30 31 to the extent provided in the agency's financing plan approved by the state finance committee. 32

33 (2) Those noninstructional facilities of higher education 34 institutions authorized in this section to enter into financial 35 contracts are not eliqible for state funded maintenance and Instructional space that is available for 36 operations. regularly scheduled classes for academic transfer, basic skills, and workforce 37

38 The energy efficiency account is hereby created in the state 39 treasury. The sums deposited in the energy ((recovery act)) Code Rev/AF:lel 101 S-5385.2/18 2nd draft <u>efficiency</u> account shall be appropriated and expended for loans, loan guarantees, and grants for projects that encourage the establishment and use of innovative and sustainable industries for renewable energy and energy efficiency technology. The balance of state funds, federal funds, and loan repayments, from the energy recovery act account, are deposited in this account.

7 **Sec. 7004.** 2018 c 2 s 7025 (uncodified) is amended to read as 8 follows:

The department of enterprise services, in consultation with the 9 10 office of financial management, may sell the property known as the Tacoma Rhodes complex to the city of Tacoma. The property consists of 11 12 the broadway building, market building, and parking garage. The department may negotiate a sale with the city of Tacoma for less than 13 fair market value, but the city must pay appraisal costs, ((all debt 14 service, all closing costs, and the cost of any outstanding 15 liabilities necessary to keep the department whole)) state bond debt, 16 federal debt, debt from certificates of participation, and all 17 closing costs. (1) The recreation and conservation office must provide a report 6 to the legislature that identifies new opportunities to generate 7 revenue to invest in future recreation-based capital projects. The 8 office must list suggestions, including a discussion of the 9 10 opportunity and challenges of each item. Among the ideas, the list 11 must contain the idea of a tax or fee on recreational equipment, goods, and services, including an estimate of total taxable value of 12 13 each suggestion. The suggestions should be based on an assumption of funding with resources that do not include general government bonds 14 15 or state general fund. The list of suggestions that are generated 16 should be with the thought of funding the types of recreational grant 17 programs that are currently administered by the office.

18 (2) In compiling the list of suggestions the office must convene 19 stakeholders with an interest in recreation, including retailers of 20 recreation gear, outdoor clothing, and equipment, organized 21 recreation associations, and other interest that benefits from 22 programs administered by the office.

(3) The office must submit a report with its suggestions to theappropriate committees of the legislature by December 1, 2018.

25 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 7008. If any provision of this act or its 26 application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the 27 remainder of the act or the application of the provision to other 28 persons or circumstances is not affected.

29 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 7009. This act is necessary for the immediate 30 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of 31 the state government and its existing public institutions, and takes 32 effect immediately.
