1 AN ACT Relating to the capital budget; making appropriations and
2 authorizing expenditures for capital improvements; amending 2018 c 2
3 ss 1006, 1016, 1018, 1020, 1021, 1026, 1027, 1031, 1032, 1040, 1041,

17 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

18 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1.** A supplemental capital budget is hereby
19 adopted and, subject to the provisions set forth in this act, the
20 several dollar amounts hereinafter specified, or so much thereof as
21 shall be sufficient to accomplish the purposes designated, are hereby

1 appropriated and authorized to be incurred for capital projects
2 during the period beginning with the effective date of this act and
3 ending June 30, 2019, out of the several funds specified in this act.

4 **PART 1**

5 **GENERAL GOVERNMENT**

6 **Sec. 1001.** 2018 c 2 s 1006 (uncodified) is amended to read as
7 follows:

8 **FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE**

9 2017-19 Housing Trust Fund Program (30000872)

10 The appropriations in this section are subject to the following
11 conditions and limitations:

12 (1) \$58,000,000 of the state taxable building construction
13 account—state appropriation, \$43,400,000 of the state building
14 construction account—state appropriation, and \$5,370,000 of the
15 Washington housing trust account—state appropriation are provided
16 solely for affordable housing and preservation of affordable housing.
17 Of the amounts in this subsection:

18 (a) \$24,370,000 is provided solely for housing projects that
19 provide supportive housing and case-management services to persons
20 with chronic mental illness. The department must prioritize low-
21 income supportive housing unit proposals that provide services or
22 include a partner community behavioral health treatment provider;

23 (b) \$10,000,000 is provided solely for housing preservation
24 grants or loans to be awarded competitively. The grants may be
25 provided for major building improvements, preservation, and system
26 replacements, necessary for the existing housing trust fund portfolio
27 to maintain long-term viability. The department must require that a
28 capital needs assessment is performed to estimate the cost of the
29 preservation project at contract execution. Funds may not be used to
30 add or expand the capacity of the property. To receive grants,
31 housing projects must meet the following requirements:

32 (i) The property is more than fifteen years old;

33 (ii) At least 50 percent of the housing units are occupied by
34 families and individuals at or below 30 percent area median income.

35 (iii) The improvements will result in reduction of operating or
36 utilities costs, or both; and

1 (iv) Other criteria that the department considers necessary to
2 achieve the purpose of this program.

3 (c) \$5,000,000 is provided solely for housing projects that
4 benefit people at or below 80 percent of the area median income who
5 have been displaced by a natural disaster declared by the governor,
6 including people who have been displaced within the last two biennia.

7 (d) \$1,000,000 of the Washington housing trust account—state
8 appropriation is provided solely for the department to work with the
9 communities of concern commission to focus on creating capital assets
10 that will help reduce poverty and build stronger and more sustainable
11 communities using the communities' cultural understanding and vision.
12 The funding must be used for predevelopment costs for capital
13 projects identified by the commission and for other activities to
14 assist communities in developing capacity to create community-owned
15 capital assets.

16 (e) \$1,000,000 of the Washington housing trust account—state
17 appropriation is provided solely for a nonprofit, public development
18 authority, local government, or housing authority to purchase the
19 south annex properties located at 1531 Broadway, 1534 Broadway, and
20 909 Pine street owned by the state board of community and technical
21 colleges. The property must be used to provide services and housing
22 for homeless youth.

23 (f) \$21,987,000 is provided solely for the following list of
24 housing projects:

- 25 (i) Cross Laminated Timber Spokane Housing Predesign. . . \$500,000
- 26 (ii) El Centro de la Raza. \$737,000
- 27 (iii) Highland Village Preservation. \$1,500,000
- 28 (iv) King County Modular Housing Project. (~~(\$3,000,000)~~)
- 29 \$1,500,000
- 30 (v) Nisqually Tribal Housing. \$1,250,000
- 31 (vi) Othello Homesight Community Center. \$3,000,000

32 (vii) \$6,000,000 is provided solely for grants for high quality
33 low-income housing projects that will quickly move people from
34 homelessness into secure housing, and are significantly less
35 expensive to construct than traditional housing. It is the intent of
36 the legislature that these grants serve projects with a total project
37 development cost per housing unit of less than \$125,000, excluding
38 the value of land, and with a commitment by the applicant to maintain
39 the housing units for at least a twenty-five year period. Amounts
40 provided that are subject to this subsection must be used to plan,

1 predesign, design, provide technical assistance and financial
2 services, purchase land for, and build innovative low-income housing
3 units. \$3,000,000 of the appropriation that is subject to this
4 subsection is provided solely for innovative affordable housing in
5 Shelton and \$3,000,000 of the appropriation that is subject to this
6 subsection is provided solely for innovative affordable housing for
7 veterans in Orting. Mental health and substance abuse counseling
8 services must be offered to residents of housing projects supported
9 by appropriations in this subsection. \$500,000 of the appropriation
10 for housing units in Shelton can be released for purchase of land,
11 planning, or predesign services before the project is fully funded.
12 \$500,000 of the appropriation for housing units in Orting can be
13 released for purchase of land, planning, or predesign services before
14 the project is fully funded.

15 (viii) \$6,000,000 is provided solely for grants to the following
16 organizations using innovative methods to address homelessness:
17 \$3,000,000 for THA Arlington drive youth campus in Tacoma and
18 \$3,000,000 for a King county housing project.

19 (ix) \$1,500,000 is provided solely for Valley Cities modular
20 housing project in Auburn.

21 (g) Of the amounts appropriated remaining after (a) through (f)
22 of this subsection, the department must allocate the funds as
23 follows:

24 (i) 10 percent is provided solely for housing projects that
25 benefit veterans;

26 (ii) 10 percent is provided solely for housing projects that
27 benefit homeownership;

28 (iii) 5 percent is provided solely for housing projects that
29 benefit people with developmental disabilities;

30 (iv) The remaining amount is provided solely for projects that
31 serve low-income and special needs populations in need of housing,
32 including, but not limited to, homeless families with children,
33 homeless youth, farmworkers, and seniors.

34 (2) In evaluating projects in this section, the department must
35 give preference for applications based on some or all of the criteria
36 in RCW 43.185.070(5).

37 (3) The department must strive to allocate all of the amounts
38 appropriated in this section within the 2017-2019 fiscal biennium in
39 the manner prescribed in subsection (1) of this section. However, if
40 upon review of applications the department determines there are not

1 adequate suitable projects in a category, the department may allocate
2 funds to projects serving other low-income and special needs
3 populations, provided those projects are located in an area with an
4 identified need for the type of housing proposed.

17 **FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE**

18 2018 Local and Community Projects (40000005)

19 The appropriations in this section are subject to the following
20 conditions and limitations:

21 (1) The department shall not expend the appropriations in this
22 section unless and until the nonstate share of project costs have
23 been either expended or firmly committed, or both, in an amount
24 sufficient to complete the project or a distinct phase of the project
25 that is useable to the public for the purpose intended by the
26 legislature. This requirement does not apply to projects where a
27 share of the appropriation is for design costs only.

28 (2) Prior to receiving funds, project recipients must demonstrate
29 that the project site is under control for a minimum of ten years,
30 either through ownership or a long-term lease. This requirement does
31 not apply to appropriations for preconstruction activities or
32 appropriations in which the sole purpose is to purchase real property
33 that does not include a construction or renovation component.

34 (3) Projects funded in this section may be required to comply
35 with Washington's high performance building standards as required by
36 chapter 39.35D RCW.

1 (4) Project funds are available on a reimbursement basis only,
2 and shall not be advanced under any circumstances.

3 (5) In contracts for grants authorized under this section the
4 department shall include provisions which require that capital
5 improvements be held by the grantee for a specified period of time
6 appropriate to the amount of the grant and that facilities be used
7 for the express purpose of the grant. If the grantee is found to be
8 out of compliance with provisions of the contract, the grantee shall
9 repay to the state general fund the principal amount of the grant
10 plus interest calculated at the rate of interest on state of
11 Washington general obligation bonds issued most closely to the date
12 of authorization of the grant.

13 (6) Projects funded in this section, including those that are
14 owned and operated by nonprofit organizations, are generally required
15 to pay state prevailing wages.

11 conservation and education values. To fulfill the goals of the 2018
12 recreation and conservation plan for Washington state, the recreation
13 and conservation office must conduct a study that identifies
14 recreational assets of statewide significance, where gaps in
15 recreational assets exist, and investment strategies and options for
16 addressing those gaps. The study must address existing and projected
17 future needs of the people of Washington state.

18 (2) The office must submit a report with its findings and
19 recommendations to the appropriate committees of the legislature by
20 June 30, 2019.

21 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 7008.** If any provision of this act or its
22 application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the
23 remainder of the act or the application of the provision to other
24 persons or circumstances is not affected.

25 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 7009.** This act is necessary for the immediate
26 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of
27 the state government and its existing public institutions, and takes
28 effect immediately.
