(1) The appropriations to the department of social and health services in this act shall be expended for the programs and in the amounts specified in this act. Appropriations made in this act to the department of social and health services shall initially be allotted as required by this act. Subsequent allotment modifications shall not include transfers of moneys between sections of this act except as expressly provided in this act, nor shall allotment modifications permit moneys that are provided solely for a specified purpose to be used for other than that purpose.

(2) The department of social and health services shall not initiate any services that require expenditure of state general fund moneys unless expressly authorized in this act or other law. The department may seek, receive, and spend, under RCW 43.79.260 through 43.79.282, federal moneys not anticipated in this act as long as the federal funding does not require expenditure of state moneys for the program in excess of amounts anticipated in this act. If the department receives unanticipated unrestricted federal moneys, those moneys shall be spent for services authorized in this act or in any other legislation providing appropriation authority, and an equal amount of appropriated state general fund moneys shall lapse. Upon the lapsing of any moneys under this subsection, the office of financial management shall notify the legislative fiscal committees. As used in this subsection, "unrestricted federal moneys" includes block grants and other funds that federal law does not require to be spent on specifically defined projects or matched on a formula basis by state funds.

(3) The legislature finds that medicaid payment rates, as calculated by the department pursuant to the appropriations in this act, bear a reasonable relationship to the costs incurred by efficiently and economically operated facilities for providing quality services and will be sufficient to enlist enough providers so that care and services are available to the extent that such care and services are available to the general population in the geographic area. The legislature finds that cost reports, payment data from the

1 federal government, historical utilization, economic data, and  
2 clinical input constitute reliable data upon which to determine the  
3 payment rates.

4 (4) The department shall to the maximum extent practicable use

1 (17) The authority shall submit reports to the governor and the

17 (19) Sufficient amounts are appropriated in this section for the  
18 authority to provide an adult dental benefit.

19 (20) The health care authority shall coordinate with the  
20 department of social and health services to provide referrals to the  
21 Washington health benefit exchange for clients that will be  
22 ineligible for medicaid.

23 (21) To facilitate a single point of entry across public and  
24 medical assistance programs, and to maximize the use of federal  
25 funding, the health care authority, the department of social and  
26 health services, and the health benefit exchange will coordinate  
27 efforts to expand HealthPlanfinder access to public assistance and  
28 medical eligibility staff. The health care authority shall complete  
29 medicaid applications in the HealthPlanfinder for households  
30 receiving or applying for medical assistance benefits.

31 (22) \$90,000 of the general fund—state appropriation for fiscal  
32 year 2020, \$90,000 of the general fund—state appropriation for fiscal  
33 year 2021, and \$180,000 of the general fund—federal appropriation are  
34 provided solely to continue operation by a nonprofit organization of  
35 a toll-free hotline that assists families to learn about and enroll  
36 in the apple health for kids program.

37 (23) Within the amounts appropriated in this section, the  
38 authority shall reimburse for primary care services provided by  
39 naturopathic physicians.

1 (24) Within the amounts appropriated in this section, the  
2 authority shall continue to provide coverage for pregnant teens that  
3 qualify under existing pregnancy medical programs, but whose  
4 eligibility for pregnancy related services would otherwise end due to  
5 the application of the new modified adjusted gross income eligibility  
6 standard.

7 (25) Sufficient amounts are appropriated in this section to  
8 remove the mental health visit limit and to provide the shingles  
9 vaccine and screening, brief intervention, and referral to treatment  
10 benefits that are available in the medicaid alternative benefit plan  
11 in the classic medicaid benefit plan.

12 (26) The authority shall use revenue appropriated from the  
13 dedicated marijuana fund for contracts with community health centers  
14 under RCW 69.50.540 in lieu of general fund—state payments to  
15 community health centers for services provided to medical assistance  
16 clients, and it is the intent of the legislature that this policy  
17 will be continued in subsequent fiscal biennia.

18 (27) Beginning no later than January 1, 2018, for any service  
19 eligible under the medicaid state plan for encounter payments,  
20 managed care organizations at the request of a rural health clinic  
21 shall pay the full published encounter rate directly to the clinic.

38 fiscal year 2021 and \$5,898,000 of the general fund—federal  
39 appropriation are provided solely for the compromise of claims in the

1 reconciliation process for rural health clinics for the calendar  
2 years 2014-2017. The authority may not recover the state portion of  
3 rural health clinic reconciliations for calendar years 2014-2017 for  
4 which no state accrual was made. If the authority determines there  
5 are unliquidated prior period accrual balances available to refund  
6 the federal government for these years, these amounts must be used  
7 prior to the amounts provided under this subsection.

8 (b) By October 15, 2019, the authority shall report to the

28 (31) \$300,000 of the general fund—state appropriation for fiscal  
29 year 2020 and (~~(\$300,000)~~) \$600,000 of the general fund—state  
30 appropriation for fiscal year 2021 are provided solely for the Bree  
31 collaborative to support collaborative learning and targeted  
32 technical assistance for quality improvement initiatives. The  
33 collaborative must use these amounts to hire one full-time staff  
34 person to promote the adoption of Bree collaborative recommendations  
35 and to hold two conferences focused on the sharing of best  
36 implementation practices.

37 (32) Within the amounts appropriated in this section, the

31 behavioral health video call center staffed by the University of  
32 Washington's department of psychiatry and behavioral sciences. The  
33 center must provide emergency department providers, primary care  
34 providers, and county and municipal correctional facility providers  
35 with on-demand access to psychiatric and substance use disorder  
36 clinical consultation. When clinically appropriate and technically

3 (41) \$22,000 of the general fund—state appropriation for fiscal  
4 year 2020, \$159,000 of the general fund—state appropriation for  
5 fiscal year 2021, and \$181,000 of the general fund—federal  
6 appropriation are provided solely to implement Substitute House Bill  
7 No. 1199 (health care/disability). (~~If the bill is not enacted by~~  
8 ~~June 30, 2019, the amounts provided in this subsection shall lapse.~~)

9 (42) \$290,000 of the general fund—state appropriation for fiscal  
10 year 2020 and (~~(\$165,000)~~) \$463,000 of the general fund—state  
11 appropriation for fiscal year 2021 are provided solely to implement  
12 Engrossed Second Substitute House Bill No. 1224 (Rx drug cost  
13 transparency). (~~If the bill is not enacted by June 30, 2019, the~~  
14 ~~amounts provided in this subsection shall lapse.~~)

15 (43) \$1,053,000 of the general fund—state appropriation for  
16 fiscal year 2020 and \$2,222,000 of the general fund—state  
17 appropriation for fiscal year 2021 are provided solely to implement  
18 Engrossed Substitute Senate Bill No. 5741 (all payer claims  
19 database). (~~If the bill is not enacted by June 30, 2019, the amounts~~  
20 ~~provided in this subsection shall lapse.~~)

21 (44) \$2,374,000 of the general fund—state appropriation for  
22 fiscal year 2020 and \$2,374,000 of the general fund—state  
23 appropriation for fiscal year 2021 are provided solely for the kidney  
24 disease program.

25 (45) The authority shall work with the department of health,  
26 other state agencies, and other hepatitis C virus medication  
27 purchasers to establish a comprehensive procurement strategy. As part  
28 of this work, the authority shall estimate, by program, any savings  
29 that will result from lower medication costs. It is the intent of the  
30 legislature to evaluate reinvesting any savings to expand treatment  
31 for individuals enrolled in state covered groups and to further the  
32 public health elimination effort during the 2020 legislative session.  
33 By October 31, 2019, the authority and department shall report to the

33 (49) \$3,150,000 of the general fund—state appropriation for  
34 fiscal year 2020 and \$3,500,000 of the general fund—state  
35 appropriation for fiscal year 2021 are provided solely to reimburse  
36 dental health aid therapists for services performed in tribal  
37 facilities for medicaid clients. The authority must leverage any

11 year 2020 and \$250,000 of the general fund—state appropriation for  
12 fiscal year 2021 are provided solely for implementation of chapter  
13 237, Laws of 2017 (paraeducators).

14 (o) \$235,000 of the general fund—state appropriation for fiscal  
15 year 2020 and (~~(\$235,000)~~) \$385,000 of the general fund—state  
16 appropriation for fiscal year 2021 are provided solely for the office  
17 of native education to increase services to tribes, including but not  
18 limited to, providing assistance to tribes and school districts to  
19 implement Since Time Immemorial, applying to become tribal compact  
20 schools, convening the Washington state native American education  
21 advisory committee, and extending professional learning opportunities  
22 to provide instruction in tribal history, culture, and government. Of  
23 the amounts provided in this subsection, \$150,000 of the general fund  
24 —state appropriation for fiscal year 2021 is provided solely for

39 fiscal year 2021 are provided solely for staff at the office of the

37 (t) \$44,000 of the general fund—state appropriation for fiscal  
38 year 2020 and \$44,000 of the general fund—state appropriation for

1 fiscal year 2021 are provided solely to pay for services for space in  
2 the state data center and networking charges.

3 (u) \$46,000 of the general fund—state appropriation for fiscal  
4 year 2020 and \$46,000 of the general fund—state appropriation for  
5 fiscal year 2021 are provided solely for a new server and backup  
6 application due to the move to the state data center.

7 (v) \$55,000 of the general fund—state appropriation for fiscal  
8 year 2021 is provided solely for the consolidated technology services  
9 to host the office's web site and for web site maintenance and  
10 support services.

11 (w) Districts shall report to the office the results of each  
12 collective bargaining agreement for certificated staff within their  
13 district using a uniform template as required by the superintendent,  
14 within thirty days of finalizing contracts. The data must include but  
15 is not limited to: Minimum and maximum base salaries, supplemental  
16 salary information, and average percent increase for all certificated

16 network. These funds may be used to purchase engineering and advanced  
17 technical support for the network.

3 council. The council of statewide members advises legislators on

5 (e) \$118,000 of the general fund—state appropriation for fiscal  
6 year 2020 and \$118,000 of the general fund—state appropriation for  
7 fiscal year 2021 are provided solely for implementation of chapter  
8 75, Laws of 2018 (dyslexia).

9 (f) \$183,000 of the general fund—state appropriation for fiscal  
10 year 2020 and \$48,000 of the general fund—state appropriation for  
11 fiscal year 2021 are provided solely for the implementation of  
12 Engrossed Substitute House Bill No. 1130 (pub. school language

15 (g) \$200,000 of the general fund—state appropriation for fiscal  
16 year 2020 and \$200,000 of the general fund—state appropriation for

22 year 2021 is provided solely for a technical advisory committee to  
23 consider and make recommendations for an apportionment system that

**HIGHER EDUCATION**

The appropriations in sections (~~605 through 611 of this act~~) 602 through 608 of this act are subject to the following conditions and limitations:

(1) "Institutions" means the institutions of higher education receiving appropriations under sections (~~605 through 611 of this act~~) 602 through 608 of this act.

(2) The legislature, the office of financial management, and other state agencies need consistent and accurate personnel data from institutions of higher education for policy planning purposes. Institutions of higher education shall report personnel data to the office of financial management for inclusion in the agency's data warehouse. Uniform reporting procedures shall be established by the office of financial management's office of the state human resources director for use by the reporting institutions, including provisions for common job classifications and common definitions of full-time equivalent staff. Annual contract amounts, number of contract months, and funding sources shall be consistently reported for employees under contract.

(3) In addition to waivers granted under the authority of RCW 28B.15.910, the governing boards and the state board may waive all or a portion of operating fees for any student. State general fund appropriations shall not be provided to replace tuition and fee revenue foregone as a result of waivers granted under this subsection.

(4) (a) For employees under the jurisdiction of chapter 41.56 or 41.80 RCW, salary increases will be in accordance with the applicable collective bargaining agreement. However, an increase shall not be provided to any classified employee whose salary is above the approved salary range maximum for the class to which the employee's position is allocated.

(b) For each institution of higher education receiving appropriations under sections (~~605 through 611 of this act~~) 602 through 608 of this act:

1 (i) The only allowable salary increases are those associated with  
2 normally occurring promotions and increases related to faculty and  
3 staff retention and as provided in Part IX of this act.

4 (ii) Institutions may provide salary increases from sources other  
5 than general fund appropriations and tuition revenues to  
6 instructional and research faculty, exempt professional staff,  
7 teaching and research assistants, as classified by the office of  
8 financial management, and all other nonclassified staff, but not  
9 including employees under chapter 41.80 RCW. It is the intent of the

12 distribution amount, if any, for each county and city as determined

15 to counties and cities in (g)(i) of this subsection (2) may not

4 methodology, reward nursing homes providing care for high acuity  
5 residents, incentivize quality care for residents of nursing homes,  
6 and establish minimum staffing standards for direct care.

7 (2) The new system must be based primarily on industry-wide  
8 costs, and have three main components: Direct care, indirect care,  
9 and capital.

10 (3) The direct care component must include the direct care and  
11 therapy care components of the previous system, along with food,  
12 laundry, and dietary services. Direct care must be paid at a fixed  
13 rate, based on one hundred percent or greater of statewide case mix  
14 neutral median costs, but shall be set so that a nursing home  
15 provider's direct care rate does not exceed one hundred eighteen  
16 percent of its base year's direct care allowable costs except if the  
17 provider is below the minimum staffing standard established in RCW  
18 74.42.360(2). Direct care must be performance-adjusted for acuity  
19 every six months, using case mix principles. Direct care must be  
20 regionally adjusted using county wide wage index information  
21 available through the United States department of labor's bureau of  
22 labor statistics. There is no minimum occupancy for direct care. The  
23 direct care component rate allocations calculated in accordance with  
24 this section must be adjusted to the extent necessary to comply with  
25 RCW 74.46.421.

26 (4) The indirect care component must include the elements of  
27 administrative expenses, maintenance costs, and housekeeping services  
28 from the previous system. A minimum occupancy assumption of ninety  
29 percent must be applied to indirect care. Indirect care must be paid  
30 at a fixed rate, based on ninety percent or greater of statewide  
31 median costs. The indirect care component rate allocations calculated

36 (e) The average age is the actual facility age reduced for  
37 significant renovations. Significant renovations are defined as those  
38 renovations that exceed two thousand dollars per bed in a calendar  
39 year as reported on the annual cost report submitted in accordance  
40 with this chapter. For the rate beginning July 1, 2016, the

1 department shall use renovation data back to 1994 as submitted on  
2 facility cost reports. Beginning July 1, 2016, facility ages must be  
3 reduced in future years if the value of the renovation completed in  
4 any year exceeds two thousand dollars times the number of licensed  
5 beds. The cost of the renovation must be divided by the accumulated

40 minimum the facility's most recent available three-quarter average

1 centers for medicare and medicaid services quality data. Point  
2 thresholds for each quality measure must be established using the  
3 corresponding statistical values for the quality measure point  
4 determinants of eighty quality measure points, sixty quality measure  
5 points, forty quality measure points, and twenty quality measure  
6 points, identified in the most recent available five-star quality  
7 rating system technical user's guide published by the center for  
8 medicare and medicaid services.

9 (d) Facilities meeting or exceeding the highest performance  
10 threshold (top level) for a quality measure receive twenty-five  
11 points. Facilities meeting the second highest performance threshold  
12 receive twenty points. Facilities meeting the third level of  
13 performance threshold receive fifteen points. Facilities in the  
14 bottom performance threshold level receive no points. Points from all  
15 quality measures must then be summed into a single aggregate quality  
16 score for each facility.

17 (e) Facilities receiving an aggregate quality score of eighty  
18 percent of the overall available total score or higher must be placed  
19 in the highest tier (tier V), facilities receiving an aggregate score  
20 of between seventy and seventy-nine percent of the overall available  
21 total score must be placed in the second highest tier (tier IV),  
22 facilities receiving an aggregate score of between sixty and sixty-  
23 nine percent of the overall available total score must be placed in  
24 the third highest tier (tier III), facilities receiving an aggregate  
25 score of between fifty and fifty-nine percent of the overall  
26 available total score must be placed in the fourth highest tier (tier  
27 II), and facilities receiving less than fifty percent of the overall  
28 available total score must be placed in the lowest tier (tier I).

29 (f) The tier system must be used to determine the amount of each  
30 facility's per patient day quality incentive component. The per  
31 patient day quality incentive component for tier IV is seventy-five  
32 percent of the per patient day quality incentive component for tier  
33 V, the per patient day quality incentive component for tier III is  
34 fifty percent of the per patient day quality incentive component for  
35 tier V, and the per patient day quality incentive component for tier  
36 II is twenty-five percent of the per patient day quality incentive  
37 component for tier V. Facilities in tier I receive no quality  
38 incentive component.

1 (g) Tier system payments must be set in a manner that ensures  
2 that the entire biennial appropriation for the quality incentive  
3 program is allocated.

4 (h) Facilities with insufficient three-quarter average centers  
5 for medicare and medicaid services quality data must be assigned to  
6 the tier corresponding to their five-star quality rating. Facilities  
7 with a five-star quality rating must be assigned to the highest tier  
8 (tier V) and facilities with a one-star quality rating must be  
9 assigned to the lowest tier (tier I). The use of a facility's five-  
10 star quality rating shall only occur in the case of insufficient  
11 centers for medicare and medicaid services minimum data set  
12 information.

13 (i) The quality incentive rates must be adjusted semiannually on  
14 July 1 and January 1 of each year using, at a minimum, the most  
15 recent available three-quarter average centers for medicare and  
16 medicaid services quality data.

17 (j) Beginning July 1, 2017, the percentage of short-stay  
18 residents who newly received an antipsychotic medication must be  
19 added as a quality measure. The department must determine the quality  
20 incentive thresholds for this quality measure in a manner consistent  
21 with those outlined in (b) through (h) of this subsection using the  
22 centers for medicare and medicaid services quality data.

23 (k) Beginning July 1, 2017, the percentage of direct care staff  
24 turnover must be added as a quality measure using the centers for  
25 medicare and medicaid services' payroll-based journal and nursing  
26 home facility payroll data. Turnover is defined as an employee  
27 departure. The department must determine the quality incentive  
28 thresholds for this quality measure using data from the centers for  
29 medicare and medicaid services' payroll-based journal, unless such  
30 data is not available, in which case the department shall use direct  
31 care staffing turnover data from the most recent medicaid cost  
32 report.

33 (7) Reimbursement of the safety net assessment imposed by chapter  
34 74.48 RCW and paid in relation to medicaid residents must be  
35 continued.

36 (8) (a) The direct care and indirect care components must be  
37 rebased in even-numbered years, beginning with rates paid on July 1,  
38 2016. Rates paid on July 1, 2016, must be based on the 2014 calendar  
39 year cost report. On a percentage basis, after rebasing, the  
40 department must confirm that the statewide average daily rate has

1 increased at least as much as the average rate of inflation, as  
2 determined by the skilled nursing facility market basket index  
3 published by the centers for medicare and medicaid services, or a  
4 comparable index. If after rebasing, the percentage increase to the  
5 statewide average daily rate is less than the average rate of  
6 inflation for the same time period, the department is authorized to  
7 increase rates by the difference between the percentage increase  
8 after rebasing and the average rate of inflation.

9 (b) It is the intention of the legislature that direct and  
10 indirect care rates paid in fiscal year 2022 will be rebased using  
11 the calendar year 2019 cost reports. For fiscal year 2021, in  
12 addition to the rates generated by (a) of this subsection, an  
13 additional adjustment is provided as established in this subsection  
14 (8)(b). For fiscal year 2021, the calendar year costs must be  
15 adjusted for inflation by a twenty-four month consumer price index,  
16 based on the most recently available monthly index for all urban  
17 consumers, as published by the bureau of labor statistics. It is also  
18 the intent of the legislature that, starting in fiscal year 2022, a  
19 facility-specific rate add-on equal to the inflation adjustment that

25 in 2017, 2018, and 2019 in comparison to costs incurred by nursing  
26 facilities.

27 (9) The direct care component provided in subsection (3) of this  
28 section is subject to the reconciliation and settlement process  
29 provided in RCW 74.46.022(6). Beginning July 1, 2016, pursuant to  
30 rules established by the department, funds that are received through  
31 the reconciliation and settlement process provided in RCW  
32 74.46.022(6) must be used for technical assistance, specialized  
33 training, or an increase to the quality enhancement established in

4 neutral, the department is authorized to cap the rate increase for

7 create a family engagement framework for early learning through  
8 school.

9 (2) At a minimum, the work group must review family engagement  
10 policies and practices in Washington and in other states, with a  
11 focus on identifying best practices that can be adopted throughout  
12 Washington.

13 (3) The members of the work group must represent the following  
14 groups: The department of children, youth, and families; the office  
15 of the superintendent of public instruction; the state board of  
16 education; parents of children in the state early childhood education  
17 and assistance program or the federal head start program; parents of  
18 students in elementary or secondary school; parents of students who  
19 are English learners, with at least one parent with a student in  
20 preschool and at least one parent with a student in elementary or  
21 secondary school; parents of students who are in special education;  
22 parents of students in foster care; the office of the education  
23 ombuds; the educational opportunity gap oversight and accountability  
24 committee; the state commission on Asian Pacific American affairs;  
25 the state commission on Hispanic affairs; the state commission on  
26 African American affairs; the governor's office of Indian affairs;  
27 the Washington state school directors' association; a state  
28 organization of school principals; a state organization of teachers;  
29 early childhood teachers; elementary and postsecondary teachers; and  
30 a state organization representing school counselors.

31 (b) The members of the work group must elect cochairs. One of the  
32 cochairs must be a parent and the other cochair must represent a  
33 state agency.

34 (4) The work group must meet monthly. At each meeting of the work  
35 group, members must have the option to participate remotely. In  
36 addition, the work group must hold at least three meetings in central  
37 Washington and at least three meetings in eastern Washington.

1 (5) Staff support for the work group must be provided by the  
2 office of the superintendent of public instruction and the department  
3 of children, youth, and families.

4 (6) Members are not entitled to be reimbursed for meal or travel  
5 expenses if they are elected officials or are participating on behalf  
6 of an employer, governmental entity, or other organization. Any  
7 reimbursement for other members is subject to chapter 43.03 RCW.

8 (7) By June 30, 2021, and in compliance with RCW 43.01.036, the  
9 office of the superintendent of public instruction must report to the  
10 appropriate committees of the legislature with a summary of the  
11 activities of the work group and its recommendations for a family  
12 engagement framework for early learning through high school.

13 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 924.** If any provision of this act or its  
14 application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the  
15 remainder of the act or the application of the provision to other  
16 persons or circumstances is not affected.

17 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 925.** This act is necessary for the immediate  
18 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of  
19 the state government and its existing public institutions, and takes  
20 effect immediately."
