

<u>SSB 5651</u> - H AMD By Representative Tharinger

1 Strike everything after the enacting clause and insert the 2 following:

3 "<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. A supplemental capital budget is hereby 4 adopted and, subject to the provisions set forth in this act, the 5 several dollar amounts hereinafter specified, or so much thereof as 6 shall be sufficient to accomplish the purposes designated, are hereby 7 appropriated and authorized to be incurred for capital projects 8 during the period beginning with the effective date of this act and 9 ending June 30, 2023, out of the several funds specified in this act.

(2) \$7,500,000 is provided solely for grants for high quality 5 low-income housing projects that will quickly move people from 6 7 homelessness into secure housing and are significantly less expensive 8 to construct than traditional housing. It is the intent of the 9 legislature that these grants serve projects with a total project development cost per housing unit of less than \$200,000, excluding 10 the value of land, and with a commitment by the applicant to maintain 11 12 the housing units for at least a 25 year period. Amounts provided 13 that are subject to this subsection (2) must be used to plan, predesign, design, provide technical assistance and financial 14 services, purchase land for, and build innovative low-income housing 15 units. \$4,500,000 of the appropriation that is subject to this 16 subsection is provided solely for innovative affordable housing in 17 Shelton and \$3,000,000 of the appropriation that is subject to this 18 subsection (2) is provided solely for innovative affordable housing 19 for veterans in Orting. Mental health and substance abuse counseling 20 services must be offered to residents of housing projects supported 21 by appropriations in this subsection (2). \$500,000 of the 22 23 appropriation for housing units in Shelton can be released for 24 purchase of land, planning, or predesign services before the project is fully funded. \$500,000 of the appropriation for housing units in 25 Orting can be released for purchase of land, planning, or predesign 26 services before the project is fully funded. 27

35 (3) The department must establish a committee to develop the 36 grant program criteria and review proposals. The committee must be 37 composed of five members as provided in this subsection. The committee must include: (a) A representative from the department of 38 39 commerce; (b) a representative from the department of archaeology and

1 historic preservation; (c) the state librarian; (d) a representative 2 from a library district; and (e) a representative from a municipal 3 library.

(4) The department must conduct a statewide solicitation of 4 project applications. The department must evaluate and rank 5 6 applications in consultation with the committee established in subsection (3) of this section, using objective criteria. The ranking 7 of projects must prioritize library district facilities listed on a 8 local, state, or federal register of historic places and those 9 located in distressed or rural counties. The evaluation and ranking 10 process must also include an examination of existing assets that 11 12 applicants propose to apply to projects. Grant assistance under this section may not exceed 50 percent of the total cost of the project. 13 The nonstate portion of the total project cost may include cash, the 14 value of real property when acquired solely for the purpose of the 15 16 project, and in-kind contributions.

17 (5) The department must submit a prioritized list of recommended projects to the governor and the legislature by October 1, 2022, for 18 inclusion in the department of commerce's 2023-2025 biennial capital 19 budget request. The list must include a description of each project, 20 the amount of recommended state funding, and documentation of 21 nonstate funds to be used for the project. Individual grants may not 22 23 exceed \$2,000,000. The total amount of recommended state funding for the projects on a biennial project list may not exceed \$10,000,000. 24

25 (6) In contracts for grants authorized under this section, the department must include provisions that require that 26 capital improvements be held by the grantee for a specified period of time 27 appropriate to the amount of the grant and that facilities be used 28 for the express purpose of the grant. If the grantee is found to be 29 out of compliance with provisions of the contract, the grantee must 30 31 repay to the state general fund the principal amount of the grant 32 plus interest calculated at the rate of interest on state of Washington general obligation bonds issued on the date most close in 33 time to the date of authorization of the grant. 34

35 (7) The department must assist grant recipients under this 36 section to apply for applicable competitive federal grant funding 37 and, upon receipt of any such funding, an equal amount of the state 38 building construction account—state appropriation must be placed in 39 unallotted status.

13 The appropriations in this section are subject to the following 14 conditions and limitations:

(1) The appropriations in this section are provided solely for 15 projects that provide a benefit to the public through development, 16 demonstration, and deployment of clean energy technologies that save 17 energy and reduce energy costs, reduce harmful air emissions, or 18 19 increase energy independence for the state. Priority must be given to projects that benefit vulnerable populations and overburdened 20 communities, including tribes and communities with high environmental 21 22 or energy burdens.

(2) The 2021 state energy strategy must guide the department in 23 the design of programs under this section, using an equity and 24 25 environmental justice lens for program structure and participation. 26 To the extent practicable, the department must prioritize projects 27 that build upon Washington's existing strengths in communities, aerospace, maritime, information and communications technology 28 (particularly data center infrastructure, artificial intelligence and 29 30 machine learning), grid modernization, advanced materials, and decarbonizing the built environment. 31

(3) Subject to the availability of funds, the department must reconvene an advisory committee to support involvement of a broad range of stakeholders in the design and implementation of programs implemented under this section to encourage collaboration, leverage partners, and engage communities and organizations in improving the equitable distribution of benefits from the program.

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(4) In soliciting and evaluating proposals, awarding contracts,
 and monitoring projects under this section, the department must:

3 (a) Ensure that competitive processes, rather than sole source
4 contracting processes, are used to select all projects, except as
5 otherwise noted in this section; and

6 (b) Conduct due diligence activities associated with the use of 7 public funds including, but not limited to, oversight of the project 8 selection process, project monitoring, and ensuring that all 9 applications and contracts fully comply with all applicable laws 10 including disclosure and conflict of interest statutes.

(5) During project solicitation periods for grants funded with 11 this appropriation, the department must maintain a list of applicants 12 by grant program that scored competitively but did not receive a 13 grant award due to lack of available funding. These applicants must 14 be considered for funding during future grant award cycles. If the 15 16 department submits a 2022 supplemental budget request for this 17 program, the request must include a list of prioritized projects by 18 grant type.

(6) (a) Pursuant to chapter 42.52 RCW, the ethics in public 19 service act, the department must require a project applicant to 20 21 identify in application materials any state of Washington employees 22 or former state employees employed by the firm or on the firm's governing board during the past 24 months. Application materials must 23 identify the individual by name, the agency previously or currently 24 25 employing the individual, job title or position held, and separation date. If it is determined by the department that a conflict of 26 interest exists, the applicant may be disqualified from further 27 consideration for award of funding. 28

(b) If the department finds, after due notice and examination, 29 that there is a violation of chapter 42.52 RCW, or any similar 30 31 statute involving a grantee who received funding under this section, 32 either in procuring or performing under the grant, the department in its sole discretion may terminate the funding grant by written 33 notice. If the grant is terminated, the department must reserve its 34 right to pursue all available remedies under law to address the 35 36 violation.

37 (7) The requirements in subsections (4) and (6) of this section38 must be specified in funding agreements issued by the department.

(8) \$17,594,000 of the state building construction account—state
 appropriation is provided solely for grid modernization grants.

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1 (a) (i) \$11,000,000 is provided solely for projects that: Advance community resilience, clean and renewable energy technologies and 2 3 transmission and distribution control systems; support integration of renewable energy sources, deployment of distributed energy resources 4 and sustainable microgrids; and support state decarbonization goals 5 6 pursuant to the clean energy transformation act, including requirements placed upon retail electric utilities. 7

8 (ii) Projects must be implemented by community organizations, 9 local governments, federally recognized tribal governments, or by 10 public and private electrical utilities that serve retail customers 11 in the state (retail electric utilities). Projects submitted by 12 applicants other than retail electric utilities must demonstrate 13 partnership with their load serving entity to apply. Priority must be 14 given to:

(A) Projects that benefit vulnerable populations, includingtribes and communities with high environmental or energy burden; and

25 (ii) For project lists submitted during the 2021-2023 fiscal 26 biennium, grant assistance under this section may not exceed:
