22 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

1 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1.** A supplemental capital budget is hereby
2 adopted and, subject to the provisions set forth in this act, the
3 several dollar amounts hereinafter specified, or so much thereof as
4 shall be sufficient to accomplish the purposes designated, are hereby
5 appropriated and authorized to be incurred for capital projects
6 during the period beginning with the effective date of this act and
7 ending June 30, 2027, out of the several funds specified in this act.

32 The appropriation in this section is subject to the following
33 conditions and limitations:

1 (1) The global war on terror memorial work group is established
2 to study and make recommendations on a memorial on the capitol campus
3 to honor service members who died in the global war on terror.

4 (2) The global war on terror memorial work group consists of:

5 (a) The secretary of state, or the secretary's designee;

6 (b) Two members from the house of representatives, one appointed
7 by the speaker of the house of representatives and one appointed by
8 the house minority leader;

9 (c) Two members from the senate, one appointed by the senate
10 majority leader and one appointed by the senate minority leader;

11 (d) The director of the department of veterans affairs, or the
12 director's designee;

13 (e) The director of the department of enterprise services, or the
14 director's designee;

15 (f) The director of the Washington state military department, or
16 the director's designee;

17 (g) A representative of the capitol campus design advisory
18 committee who is not the secretary of state or a legislative member
19 already appointed to the work group;

20 (h) Three representatives from veterans' organizations, appointed
21 by the secretary of state;

22 (i) One surviving family member of a service member who was
23 killed in Operation Iraqi Freedom, Operation Enduring Freedom, or
24 Operation New Dawn, or who died by suicide after serving in these
25 wars, appointed by the secretary of state; and

26 (j) The state archivist, or the state archivist's designee, in a
27 nonvoting consultancy role.

28 (3) The global war on terror memorial work group must convene its
29 initial meeting before July 15, 2026, and must meet at least
30 quarterly thereafter. At its initial meeting, the members shall
31 select two cochairs from among its membership.

32 (4) The global war on terror memorial work group must provide the
33 capitol committee with a report detailing:

34 (a) Recommended name for the memorial;

35 (b) Recommended names of individuals to be honored at the
36 memorial;

37 (c) Recommended locations on the capitol campus where the
38 memorial could be constructed, including any permit requirements or
39 other restrictions that may exist for each location;

1 (d) Recommendations for a sculptor to design and carve or cast
2 the memorial;

3 (e) Potential draft designs for the memorial;

4 (f) Recommended funding sources to carry out the purposes of this
5 section; and

6 (g) A proposed budget to fully cover the costs for:

7 (i) The design, construction, transportation, and placement of
8 the memorial;

9 (ii) Any required permits;

10 (iii) Anticipated ongoing maintenance costs based on potential
11 materials used and historical maintenance of other memorials on the
12 capitol campus;

13 (iv) A ceremony to commemorate the unveiling of the memorial; and

14 (v) Other expenses that may be necessary for the planning,
15 construction, and placement of the memorial.

16 (5) Within 30 days of receiving sufficient funds to fully cover
17 costs described under subsection (4)(g) of this section, the
18 department of enterprise services shall begin the contracting process
19 with a sculptor recommended by the state capitol committee. The
20 capitol committee must provide written notice to affected parties,
21 the chief clerk of the house of representatives, the secretary of the
22 senate, and others deemed appropriate by the capitol committee upon
23 receiving sufficient funds to fully cover costs described under
24 subsection (4)(g) of this section.

25 (6) The capitol committee is encouraged to complete the planning,
26 construction, and placement of the memorial within five years of the
27 condition under subsection (5) of this section being met. The global
28 war on terror memorial work group shall arrange for a ceremony to
29 celebrate the unveiling of the memorial.

30 (7) The global war on terror memorial work group may:

31 (a) Perform all other matters and things necessary to carry out
32 the purposes of this section; and

33 (b) Solicit and receive gifts, grants, or endowments from public
34 and private sources that are made in trust or otherwise for the use
35 and benefit of the purposes of the committee in carrying out this
36 section. All receipts from gifts, grants, and endowments received
37 under this subsection must be deposited in the Washington state
38 global war on terror memorial account established in RCW 43.34.105.

39 (8) Staff support for the work group must be provided by the
40 office of the secretary of state.

1 (9) Members of the work group shall receive no compensation for
2 their service as members of the work group. However, legislative
3 members of the work group may be reimbursed for travel expenses in
4 accordance with RCW 44.04.120. Nonlegislative members, except those
5 who are participating on behalf of an employer, governmental entity,
6 or other organization, may be reimbursed for travel and other
7 expenses in accordance with chapter 43.03 RCW.

30 The appropriations in this section are subject to the following
31 conditions and limitations:

32 (1) (a) \$51,000,000 of the Ruth LeCocq Kagi early learning
33 facilities development account—state appropriation in this section is
34 provided solely for the early learning facility grant and loan
35 program, subject to the provisions of RCW 43.31.565 through

1 43.31.583, and 43.84.092, to provide state assistance for designing,
2 constructing, purchasing, expanding, or modernizing public or private
3 early learning education facilities for eligible organizations. Up to
4 3.5 percent of the funding in this subsection (1) may be used by the
5 department of children, youth, and families to provide technical
6 assistance to early learning providers interested in applying for the
7 early learning facility grant or loan program.

8 (b) The department is encouraged to leverage private and public
9 match funds when feasible and may not require match funds for
10 applicants experiencing financial hardship. The department may not
11 consider the level of project match funds as a competitive criterion
12 when selecting or recommending projects for funding.

13 (c) Grants may include awards for construction, renovation, or
14 facility purchase projects that will increase early childhood
15 education and assistance program capacity by supporting conversion of
16 slots from part day programs to full day programs or extended day
17 programs, or conversion of full day programs to extended day
18 programs, as defined in RCW 43.216.010.

19 (2) (~~(\$9,000,000)~~) \$16,300,000 of the Ruth LeCocq Kagi early
20 learning facilities development account—state appropriation in this
21 section is provided solely for minor renovation grants.

22 (3) \$6,000,000 of the Ruth LeCocq Kagi early learning facilities
23 revolving account—state appropriation and \$3,000,000 of the Ruth
24 LeCocq Kagi early learning facilities development account—state
25 appropriation in this section are provided solely for the Washington
26 early learning loan fund. Of the funds provided in this subsection
27 (3), \$3,000,000 of the Ruth LeCocq Kagi early learning facilities
28 development account—state appropriation is provided solely for
29 emergency grants pursuant to chapter 21 (House Bill No. 1314), Laws
30 of 2025. Up to four percent of the funding in this subsection (3) may
31 be used by the contractor to provide technical assistance to early
32 learning providers. The department may not use any portion of the
33 appropriation in this subsection (3) for administrative expenses of
34 the department.

35 (4) The department of children, youth, and families must develop
36 methodology to identify, at the school district boundary level, the
37 geographic locations of where early childhood education and
38 assistance program slots are needed to meet the entitlement specified
39 in RCW 43.216.556. This methodology must be linked to the caseload

1 forecast produced by the caseload forecast council and must include
2 estimates of the number of slots needed at each school district. This
3 methodology must inform any early learning facilities needs
4 assessment conducted by the department and the department of
5 children, youth, and families. This methodology must be included as
6 part of the budget submittal documentation required by RCW 43.88.030.

7 (5) When prioritizing areas with the highest unmet need for early
8 childhood education and assistance program slots, the committee of
9 early learning experts convened by the department pursuant to RCW
10 43.31.581 must first consider those areas at risk of not meeting the
11 entitlement specified in RCW 43.216.556.

12 (6) The department must track the number of slots being renovated
13 separately from the number of slots being constructed and, within
14 these categories, must track the number of slots separately by
15 program for the working connections child care program and the early
16 childhood education and assistance program.

17 (7) When prioritizing applications for projects pursuant to RCW
18 43.31.581, the department must award priority points to applications
19 from a rural county or from extreme child care deserts as defined by
20 the department of children, youth, and families.

21 (8) For early learning facilities collocated with affordable or
22 supportive housing developments, the department may remit state
23 funding on a reimbursement basis for 100 percent of eligible project
24 costs, regardless of the project's match amount, once the nonstate
25 share of project costs have been either expended or firmly committed
26 in an amount sufficient to complete the entire project or a distinct
27 phase of the project that is useable to the public as an early
28 learning facility.

27 The appropriation in this section is subject to the following
28 conditions and limitations:

29 (1) (a) ((~~\$25,000,000~~)) \$45,000,000 of the appropriation is
30 provided solely for the department to administer grants to eligible
31 third-party administrators for heat pump and other high-efficiency
32 electric equipment rebates, with a focus on low and moderate-income
33 households, renters, nonprofit organizations, and small businesses.
34 State incentives and rebates for installation of high-efficiency
35 electric equipment, including electrical panel upgrades, provide a
36 benefit to the public consistent with the state's energy strategy and
37 climate mandates by reducing greenhouse gas emissions from the built

1 environment. The department shall administer the grant program in a
2 manner that seeks to maximize greenhouse gas emissions reductions.

3 (b) (~~(\$5,000,000)~~) \$20,000,000 of the appropriation is provided
4 solely for the department to administer grants to eligible third-
5 party administrators for heat pumps for adult family homes.

6 (2) The department shall implement a statewide high-efficiency
7 electric equipment program consistent with the following:

8 (a) Aid the transition of residential and commercial buildings
9 away from fossil fuels by providing education and outreach resources
10 for the installation of high-efficiency electric heat pumps and other
11 high-efficiency electric equipment;

12 (b) Provide grants, coordination, and technical assistance to
13 eligible third-party administrators to promote the adoption of high-
14 efficiency electric heat pump equipment for space and water heating;
15 and

16 (c) Develop strategies to ensure that the program serves low-
17 income households, vulnerable populations, and overburdened
18 communities, including dedicating at least 40 percent of the program
19 funding for this purpose. For the purposes of this subsection (2)(c),
20 "overburdened communities" has the same meaning as in RCW 70A.65.010
21 and "vulnerable populations" has the same meaning as in RCW
22 70A.02.010.

23 (3) For the purposes of this section, "eligible third-party
24 administrators" include, but are not limited to, nonprofits,
25 utilities, housing providers, community action agencies, and
26 community-based organizations.

38 2025-27 Behavioral Health Facilities (40000667)

1 The appropriation in this section is subject to the following
2 conditions and limitations:

3 (1) The appropriation in this section is provided solely for the
4 department to issue grants to community hospitals or other community
5 providers to expand and establish new and preserve existing capacity
6 for behavioral health services in communities. The department must
7 consult an advisory group consisting of representatives from the
8 department of social and health services, the health care authority,
9 one representative from a managed care organization, one
10 representative from an accountable care organization, and one
11 representative from the association of county human services. The
12 amounts provided in this section may be used for construction and
13 equipment costs associated with establishment or preservation of the
14 facilities. The department may approve funding for the acquisition of
15 a facility if the project will result in increased behavioral health
16 capacity. Amounts provided in this section may not be used for
17 operating costs associated with the treatment of patients using these
18 services.

19 (2) The department must establish criteria for the issuance of
20 the grants, which must include:

21 (a) Evidence that the application was developed in collaboration
22 with one or more regional behavioral health entities that administer
23 the purchasing of services;

24 (b) Evidence that the applicant has assessed and would meet gaps
25 in the geographical availability and service needs of behavioral
26 health services in their region;

27 (c) Evidence that the applicant is able to meet applicable
28 licensing and certification requirements in the facility that will be
29 used to provide services;

30 (d) A commitment by applicants to serve persons who are publicly
31 funded and persons detained for involuntary commitment, as applicable
32 by facility type, under chapter 71.05 RCW;

33 (e) A commitment by the applicant to maintain and operate the
34 beds or facility for a time period commensurate to the state
35 investment, but for at least a 10-year period;

36 (f) The date upon which structural modifications or construction
37 would begin and the anticipated date of completion of the project;

38 (g) A detailed estimate of the costs associated with opening the
39 beds;

1 (h) A financial plan demonstrating the applicant's ability to
2 maintain and operate the facility; and

3 (i) The applicant's commitment to work with local courts and
4 prosecutors as applicable to ensure that prosecutors and courts in
5 the area served by the hospital or facility will be available to
6 conduct involuntary commitment hearings and proceedings under chapter
7 71.05 RCW.

8 (3) In awarding funding for projects in subsection (5) of this
9 section, the department, in consultation with the advisory group
10 established in subsection (1) of this section, must strive for
11 geographic distribution and to allocate funding based on population
12 and service needs of an area. The department must consider current
13 services available, anticipated services available based on projects
14 underway, and the service delivery needs of an area.

15 (4) The department must prioritize projects that increase
16 capacity in unserved and underserved areas of the state.

17 (5) (~~(\$70,000,000)~~) \$17,505,000 of the state building
18 construction account—state appropriation in this section is provided
19 solely for competitive community behavioral health grants to address
20 regional needs and noncompetitive closure prevention grants. Closure
21 prevention grants must be awarded on a first-come, first-served
22 basis. For competitive regional needs grants, priority must be given
23 to: Youth and adult bed capacity with consideration given to gaps
24 identified in the 2024 behavioral health capital grant facility
25 funding report; and facilities that serve specialized populations,
26 including, but not limited to, services for individuals with
27 traumatic brain injury, dementia, and cooccurring complex needs of
28 youth. Additional categories of facilities may be funded based on
29 identified needs of a region. Eligible facilities include, but are
30 not limited to:

31 (a) Crisis relief centers and stabilization facilities that offer
32 access to mental health and substance use care for no more than 23
33 hours and 59 minutes per patient, at a time, and are not subject to
34 federal funding restrictions that apply to institutions of mental
35 diseases;

36 (b) Mental health peer respite centers that are not subject to
37 federal funding restrictions that apply to institutions of mental
38 diseases. No more than one mental health peer respite center should
39 be funded in each of the 10 regions;

1 (c) Grants to community providers to increase long-term intensive
2 inpatient psychiatric treatment services and capacity for children
3 and minor youth including, but not limited to, services for substance
4 use disorder treatment, sexual assault and traumatic stress, anxiety,
5 or depression, and interventions for children exhibiting aggressive
6 or depressive behaviors in facilities that are not subject to federal
7 funding restrictions;

8 (d) Grants to community hospitals, freestanding evaluation and
9 treatment providers, or freestanding psychiatric hospitals to develop
10 capacity for beds to serve individuals on 90-day or 180-day civil
11 commitments as an alternative to treatment in the state hospitals. In
12 awarding this funding, the department must coordinate with the
13 department of social and health services, the health care authority,
14 and the department of health and must only select facilities that
15 meet the following conditions:

16 (i) The funding must be used to increase capacity related to
17 serving individuals who will be transitioned from or diverted from
18 the state hospitals;

19 (ii) The facility is not subject to federal funding restrictions
20 that apply to institutions of mental diseases;

21 (iii) The provider has submitted a proposal for operating the
22 facility to the health care authority;

23 (iv) The provider has demonstrated to the department of health
24 and the health care authority that it is able to meet the applicable
25 licensing and certification requirements for the facility that will
26 be used to provide services; and

27 (v) The health care authority has confirmed that it intends to
28 contract with the facility for operating costs within funds provided
29 in the operating budget for these purposes;

30 (e) Enhanced adult residential care facilities for long-term
31 dementia placements discharged or diverted from the state psychiatric
32 hospitals and are not subject to federal funding restrictions that
33 apply to institutions of mental diseases;

34 (f) Facilities that provide substance use disorder intervention,
35 assessment, and treatment services with secure withdrawal management
36 and stabilization treatment beds that are not subject to federal
37 funding restrictions that apply to institutions of mental diseases;
38 and

39 (g) Facilities where behavioral health supportive services, such
40 as harm reduction and physical health services, are offered within

1 the same facility as behavioral health services and that are not
2 subject to federal funding restrictions that apply to institutions of
3 mental diseases.

4 (6) \$10,000,000 of the state building construction account—state
5 appropriation in this section is provided solely for one crisis
6 stabilization facility in the King county region consistent with the
7 settlement agreement in *A.B., by and through Trueblood, et al., v.*
8 *DSHS, et al.*, No. 15-35462, that is not subject to federal funding
9 restrictions that apply to institutions of mental disease. In
10 awarding this funding, the department must coordinate with the health
11 care authority and the King county behavioral health administrative
12 service organization and must only select a facility that has been
13 selected by King county's crisis care centers initiative as the
14 crisis care center for the south King county region.

37 solely for the purchase of the former Daybreak Youth Services
38 building located in Clark County, Washington. Title of the property

1 must be held in the name of the state under the custody and control
2 of the department of enterprise services.

3 (b) The department, with the assistance of the department of
4 enterprise services, shall facilitate a lease agreement with Madrona
5 Recovery Center, Inc. (Madrona) for a term of no less than 10 years,
6 at a lease cost of \$1 per year. As a condition of the lease, the
7 department shall obtain commitments and acknowledgments from Madrona
8 as follows:

9 (i) The building will be operated for the purpose of providing
10 substance use disorder treatment and other behavioral health
11 treatment services to children and minor youth throughout the term of
12 the lease;

13 (ii) Madrona is able to meet applicable licensing and
14 certification requirements necessary to operate the facility;

15 (iii) Madrona commits to prioritizing services for persons who
16 are publicly funded and are residents of the state of Washington;

17 (iv) Madrona has provided a detailed estimate of the costs
18 associated with opening the beds at the facility;

19 (v) The date upon which structural modifications or construction
20 would begin and the anticipated date of completion of the project,
21 with an anticipated opening date of the facility that is no more than
22 12 months from commencement of the lease; and

23 (vi) Madrona has submitted a financial plan demonstrating its
24 ability to maintain and operate the facility, including confirmation
25 that the health care authority, department of social and health
26 services, or a managed care organization plans to contract with the
27 facility sufficient to cover the facility's operating costs.

28 (c) \$1,000,000 of the state building construction account—state
29 appropriation in this section is provided solely to Madrona for the
30 purpose of tenant improvements necessary to operate the building for
31 the purposes outlined in (b) of this subsection. The department must
32 inform Madrona of its obligation to pay prevailing wage in completing
33 tenant improvements financed by the state. Subsequent maintenance and
34 repairs during the term of the lease are the responsibility of
35 Madrona.

36 (d) \$200,000 of the state building construction account—state
37 appropriation in this section is provided solely for the
38 administrative costs associated with this project.

1 (8) The department shall notify all applicants that they may be
2 required to have a construction review performed by the department of
3 health.

4 (9) To accommodate the emergent need for behavioral health
5 services, the department and the department of health, in
6 collaboration with the health care authority and the department of
7 social and health services, must establish a concurrent and expedited
8 process to assist grant applicants in meeting any applicable
9 regulatory requirements necessary to operate inpatient psychiatric
10 beds, freestanding evaluation and treatment facilities, enhanced
11 services facilities, triage facilities, crisis stabilization
12 facilities, or secure detoxification/secure withdrawal management and
13 stabilization facilities.

14 (10) The department must strive to allocate all of the amounts
15 provided in this section in the manner prescribed in each subsection.
16 However, if upon review of applications, the department determines,
17 in consultation with the advisory group established in subsection (1)
18 of this section, that there are not adequate suitable projects in a
19 category, the department may allocate funding to other project
20 categories listed in this section, prioritizing projects that support
21 serving individuals who will be transitioned from or diverted from
22 the state hospitals. Underserved areas of the state may also be
23 considered.

24 (11) In contracts for grants authorized under this section, the
25 department must include provisions that require that the grantee or
26 successor hold the capital improvements for at least a 10-year
27 period. The provisions must require the facility to be used for
28 behavioral health services, but may allow the facility to change
29 ownership or facility type during the commitment period. The
30 department shall monitor the activities of recipients of grants under
31 this program to determine compliance with the terms and conditions
32 set forth in its contract.

33 (12) The department must provide a progress report to the
34 appropriate committees of the legislature by September 1, 2024. The
35 report must include:

36 (a) The total number of applications and amount of funding
37 requested;

38 (b) A list and description of the projects approved for funding
39 including state funding, total project cost, services anticipated to
40 be provided, bed capacity, and anticipated completion date;

1 (c) A statewide map of new capacity since 2018, including
2 projected bed capacity and opening dates;

3 (d) A status report of projects that received funding in prior
4 funding rounds, including details about the project completion and
5 the date the facility began providing services; and

6 (e) Recommendations for statutory language that would codify the
7 grant program on an ongoing basis including:

8 (i) Evaluation and prioritization criteria;

9 (ii) Monitoring and compliance requirements;

10 (iii) Preconstruction and technical assistance services; and

11 (iv) Data needed to determine the service needs by area of the
12 state.

13 (13) The department must coordinate with the health care
14 authority to submit capital budget requests to fund behavioral health
15 community capacity grants for the 2025-2027 biennial budget by the
16 due date established by the office of financial management.
17 Associated state budget operating costs must also be identified and
18 requested.

35 expended or firmly committed, or both, in an amount sufficient to
36 complete the project or a distinct phase of the project that is
37 useable to the public for the purpose intended by the legislature.

1 This requirement does not apply to projects where a share of the
2 appropriation is for design costs only.

3 (2) Prior to receiving funds, project recipients must demonstrate
4 that the project site is under control for a minimum of 10 years,
5 either through ownership or a long-term lease. This requirement does
6 not apply to appropriations for preconstruction activities or
7 appropriations in which the sole purpose is to purchase real property
8 that does not include a construction or renovation component.

9 (3) Projects funded in this section may be required to comply

10 (~~(\$631,176,449)~~) \$584,977,090 for the 2029-2031 biennium.

11 **Sec. 8002.** 2025 c 414 s 8002 (uncodified) is amended to read as
12 follows:

13 (1) The following agencies may enter into financial contracts,
14 paid from any funds of an agency, appropriated or nonappropriated,
15 for the purposes indicated and in not more than the principal amounts
16 indicated, plus financing expenses and required reserves pursuant to

20 (b) An explanation of the reason for the waiver; and

21 (c) A rough order of magnitude cost estimate for the project's

25 following factors:

26 (a) Whether there is any determination to be made regarding the
27 site of the project;

28 (b) Whether there is any determination to be made regarding

10 (1) The legislature finds that use of life-cycle cost analysis
11 will aid public entities, architects, engineers, and contractors in
12 making design and construction decisions that positively impact both
13 the initial construction cost and the ongoing operating and
14 maintenance cost of a project. To ensure that the total cost of a
15 project is accounted for and the most reasonable and cost efficient
16 design is used, agencies shall develop life-cycle costs for any
17 construction project over \$10,000,000. The life-cycle costs must
18 represent the present value sum of capital costs, installation costs,
19 operating costs, and maintenance costs over the life expectancy of
20 the project. The legislature further finds the most effective
21 approach to the life-cycle cost analysis is to integrate it into the

21 (uncodified) to read as follows:

22 The legislature finds that affordable local government
23 infrastructure is necessary to support affordable communities and new
24 housing construction, amongst other state priorities. The lack of
25 comprehensive statewide data on the condition and capacity of water,
26 wastewater, stormwater, roads, bridges, and solid waste systems poses
27 growing risks to public health, environmental quality, housing
28 availability, and economic vitality. Local and tribal governments
29 lack sufficient resources to maintain, repair, and expand aging
30 infrastructure, demonstrating that existing funding and capacity are
31 inadequate to meet current and future infrastructure needs. To that

4 well as other direct appropriations, are a vital means of responding
5 directly to pressing and emergent community needs across the state.
6 Therefore, it is the intent of the legislature to provide the
7 department of commerce with direction regarding the implementation of
8 these projects, including changes to their scope and location, so as
9 to facilitate their timely completion and in a manner that is
10 consistent with legislative intent.

32 (e) The change request is due to the project experiencing higher
33 than estimated bids and the entity is requesting to use the funding
34 for one or more, but fewer than all, of the project's components.

35 (3) For change requests received by the department between the
36 effective date of this act and the end of the 2025-2027 fiscal
37 biennium, the department of commerce may not approve change requests
38 for noncompetitively awarded grants that are appropriated on a line
39 item basis and administered by the department in parts I and VI of
40 this act that meet any of the following conditions:

1 (a) The change request would alter the fundamental purpose or
2 object of the project;

3 (b) The change request would move the location of the project
4 from one legislative district to another; or

5 (c) The change request proposes to spend funding on a component
6 that does not meet the overall goal of the project and the component
7 is not a part of the original project.

8 (4) Between July 1, 2026, and June 30, 2027, the department of
9 commerce must send quarterly project change request reports pursuant

23 balance of the grant; (i) the contract status of the grant; (j) the
24 department's decisions regarding approved change requests; and (k)
25 the department's planned decisions regarding the rejection of change
26 requests.

27 (5) Between July 1, 2026, and June 30, 2027, the department of
28 commerce is subject to the following conditions:

29 (a) The department must submit the quarterly change report in
30 this section no later than the first business day of each quarter.

31 (b) The department may not reject project change requests
32 pursuant to this section until 10 business days following the
33 submission of a quarterly report in this section.

34 (c) On December 15, 2026, the department must submit a
35 supplemental report to the following: (a) The chair and ranking
36 member of the house of representatives capital budget committee; (b)
37 to the capital budget leads of the senate ways and means committee;
38 and (c) to the coordinating capital budget staff of these committees.
