BRIEF DESCRIPTION: Concerning the capital budget.

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

2 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1.** A supplemental capital budget is hereby
3 adopted and, subject to the provisions set forth in this act, the
4 several dollar amounts hereinafter specified, or so much thereof as
5 shall be sufficient to accomplish the purposes designated, are hereby
6 appropriated and authorized to be incurred for capital projects
7 during the period beginning with the effective date of this act and
8 ending June 30, 2027, out of the several funds specified in this act.

10 **GENERAL GOVERNMENT**

11 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1001.** A new section is added to 2025 c 414
12 (uncodified) to read as follows:

13 **SPECIAL APPROPRIATION FOR THE GOVERNOR**

14 Point Whitney Appraisal (92000002)

15 The appropriation in this section is subject to the following
16 conditions and limitations:

17 (1) The appropriation in this section is provided solely for
18 expenditure for the costs associated with obtaining an appraisal for
19 the fair market value of the state-owned property managed by the
20 department of fish and wildlife and commonly known as Point Whitney.
21 The appraisal is in anticipation of the sale and transfer of the
22 property to the Jamestown S'Klallam tribe as provided in Section 3012
23 of this act. The office of financial management shall approve the
24 expenditure of funds for the appraisal, consistent with the
25 provisions of this section.

26 (2) The department of fish and wildlife must enter into a
27 contract to obtain an appraisal for the fair market value of the
28 parcel no later than June 30, 2026, and provide a copy of the
29 contract to the governor, house capital budget committee, and senate
30 ways and means committee.

31 (3) If the department of fish and wildlife fails to enter into a
32 contract for the appraisal as provided in subsection (2), the
33 department of natural resources must conduct the appraisal of the
34 Point Whitney property. The department of natural resources shall
35 complete and provide a copy of the appraisal to the governor, house

1 capital budget committee, and senate ways and means committee by
2 December 1, 2026.

10 The appropriation in this section is subject to the following
11 conditions and limitations:

12 (1) (a) (~~(\$25,000,000)~~) \$42,000,000 of the appropriation is
13 provided solely for the department to administer grants to eligible
14 third-party administrators for heat pump and other high-efficiency
15 electric equipment rebates, with a focus on low and moderate-income
16 households, renters, nonprofit organizations, and small businesses.
17 State incentives and rebates for installation of high-efficiency
18 electric equipment, including electrical panel upgrades, provide a
19 benefit to the public consistent with the state's energy strategy and
20 climate mandates by reducing greenhouse gas emissions from the built
21 environment. The department shall administer the grant program in a
22 manner that seeks to maximize greenhouse gas emissions reductions.

23 (b) \$5,000,000 of the appropriation is provided solely for the
24 department to administer grants to eligible third-party
25 administrators for heat pumps for adult family homes.

26 (2) The department shall implement a statewide high-efficiency
27 electric equipment program consistent with the following:

28 (a) Aid the transition of residential and commercial buildings
29 away from fossil fuels by providing education and outreach resources
30 for the installation of high-efficiency electric heat pumps and other
31 high-efficiency electric equipment;

32 (b) Provide grants, coordination, and technical assistance to
33 eligible third-party administrators to promote the adoption of high-
34 efficiency electric heat pump equipment for space and water heating;
35 and

36 (c) Develop strategies to ensure that the program serves low-
37 income households, vulnerable populations, and overburdened
38 communities, including dedicating at least 40 percent of the program

1 funding for this purpose. For the purposes of this subsection (2)(c),
2 "overburdened communities" has the same meaning as in RCW 70A.65.010
3 and "vulnerable populations" has the same meaning as in RCW
4 70A.02.010.

5 (3) For the purposes of this section, "eligible third-party
6 administrators" include, but are not limited to, nonprofits,
7 utilities, housing providers, community action agencies, and
8 community-based organizations.

20 2025-27 Behavioral Health Facilities (40000667)

21 The appropriation in this section is subject to the following
22 conditions and limitations:

23 (1) The appropriation in this section is provided solely for the
24 department to issue grants to community hospitals or other community
25 providers to expand and establish new and preserve existing capacity
26 for behavioral health services in communities. The department must
27 consult an advisory group consisting of representatives from the
28 department of social and health services, the health care authority,
29 one representative from a managed care organization, one
30 representative from an accountable care organization, and one
31 representative from the association of county human services. The
32 amounts provided in this section may be used for construction and
33 equipment costs associated with establishment or preservation of the
34 facilities. The department may approve funding for the acquisition of
35 a facility if the project will result in increased behavioral health
36 capacity. Amounts provided in this section may not be used for
37 operating costs associated with the treatment of patients using these
38 services.

1 (2) The department must establish criteria for the issuance of
2 the grants, which must include:

3 (a) Evidence that the application was developed in collaboration
4 with one or more regional behavioral health entities that administer
5 the purchasing of services;

6 (b) Evidence that the applicant has assessed and would meet gaps
7 in the geographical availability and service needs of behavioral
8 health services in their region;

9 (c) Evidence that the applicant is able to meet applicable
10 licensing and certification requirements in the facility that will be
11 used to provide services;

12 (d) A commitment by applicants to serve persons who are publicly
13 funded and persons detained for involuntary commitment, as applicable
14 by facility type, under chapter 71.05 RCW;

15 (e) A commitment by the applicant to maintain and operate the
16 beds or facility for a time period commensurate to the state
17 investment, but for at least a 10-year period;

18 (f) The date upon which structural modifications or construction
19 would begin and the anticipated date of completion of the project;

20 (g) A detailed estimate of the costs associated with opening the
21 beds;

22 (h) A financial plan demonstrating the applicant's ability to
23 maintain and operate the facility; and

24 (i) The applicant's commitment to work with local courts and
25 prosecutors as applicable to ensure that prosecutors and courts in
26 the area served by the hospital or facility will be available to
27 conduct involuntary commitment hearings and proceedings under chapter
28 71.05 RCW.

29 (3) In awarding funding for projects in subsection (5) of this
30 section, the department, in consultation with the advisory group
31 established in subsection (1) of this section, must strive for
32 geographic distribution and to allocate funding based on population
33 and service needs of an area. The department must consider current
34 services available, anticipated services available based on projects
35 underway, and the service delivery needs of an area.

36 (4) The department must prioritize projects that increase
37 capacity in unserved and underserved areas of the state.

38 (5) (~~(\$70,000,000)~~) \$63,312,000 of the state building
39 construction account—state appropriation in this section is provided
40 solely for competitive community behavioral health grants to address

1 regional needs and noncompetitive closure prevention grants. Closure
2 prevention grants must be awarded on a first-come, first-served
3 basis. For competitive regional needs grants, priority must be given
4 to: Youth and adult bed capacity with consideration given to gaps
5 identified in the 2024 behavioral health capital grant facility
6 funding report; and facilities that serve specialized populations,
7 including, but not limited to, services for individuals with
8 traumatic brain injury, dementia, and cooccurring complex needs of
9 youth. Additional categories of facilities may be funded based on
10 identified needs of a region. Eligible facilities include, but are
11 not limited to:

12 (a) Crisis relief centers and stabilization facilities that offer
13 access to mental health and substance use care for no more than 23
14 hours and 59 minutes per patient, at a time, and are not subject to
15 federal funding restrictions that apply to institutions of mental
16 diseases;

17 (b) Mental health peer respite centers that are not subject to
18 federal funding restrictions that apply to institutions of mental
19 diseases. No more than one mental health peer respite center should
20 be funded in each of the 10 regions;

21 (c) Grants to community providers to increase long-term intensive
22 inpatient psychiatric treatment services and capacity for children
23 and minor youth including, but not limited to, services for substance
24 use disorder treatment, sexual assault and traumatic stress, anxiety,
25 or depression, and interventions for children exhibiting aggressive
26 or depressive behaviors in facilities that are not subject to federal
27 funding restrictions;

28 (d) Grants to community hospitals, freestanding evaluation and
29 treatment providers, or freestanding psychiatric hospitals to develop
30 capacity for beds to serve individuals on 90-day or 180-day civil
31 commitments as an alternative to treatment in the state hospitals. In
32 awarding this funding, the department must coordinate with the
33 department of social and health services, the health care authority,
34 and the department of health and must only select facilities that
35 meet the following conditions:

36 (i) The funding must be used to increase capacity related to
37 serving individuals who will be transitioned from or diverted from
38 the state hospitals;

39 (ii) The facility is not subject to federal funding restrictions
40 that apply to institutions of mental diseases;

1 (iii) The provider has submitted a proposal for operating the
2 facility to the health care authority;

3 (iv) The provider has demonstrated to the department of health
4 and the health care authority that it is able to meet the applicable
5 licensing and certification requirements for the facility that will
6 be used to provide services; and

7 (v) The health care authority has confirmed that it intends to
8 contract with the facility for operating costs within funds provided
9 in the operating budget for these purposes;

10 (e) Enhanced adult residential care facilities for long-term
11 dementia placements discharged or diverted from the state psychiatric
12 hospitals and are not subject to federal funding restrictions that
13 apply to institutions of mental diseases;

14 (f) Facilities that provide substance use disorder intervention,
15 assessment, and treatment services with secure withdrawal management
16 and stabilization treatment beds that are not subject to federal
17 funding restrictions that apply to institutions of mental diseases;
18 and

19 (g) Facilities where behavioral health supportive services, such
20 as harm reduction and physical health services, are offered within
21 the same facility as behavioral health services and that are not
22 subject to federal funding restrictions that apply to institutions of
23 mental diseases.

24 (6) \$10,000,000 of the state building construction account—state
25 appropriation in this section is provided solely for one crisis
26 stabilization facility in the King county region consistent with the
27 settlement agreement in *A.B., by and through Trueblood, et al., v.*
28 *DSHS, et al.*, No. 15-35462, that is not subject to federal funding
29 restrictions that apply to institutions of mental disease. In
30 awarding this funding, the department must coordinate with the health
31 care authority and the King county behavioral health administrative
32 service organization and must only select a facility that has been
33 selected by King county's crisis care centers initiative as the
34 crisis care center for the south King county region.

14 (9) During the 2025-2027 fiscal biennium, where the department
15 has awarded a grant for the operation of a crisis diversion or
16 stabilization facility located in Pierce county that is not subject
17 to federal funding restrictions that apply to institutions of mental
18 diseases, the department may amend the contract associated with the
19 grant in order to authorize the facility to be used for any community
20 development block grant national objective.

21 (10) The department shall notify all applicants that they may be
22 required to have a construction review performed by the department of
23 health.

24 (11) To accommodate the emergent need for behavioral health
25 services, the department and the department of health, in
26 collaboration with the health care authority and the department of
27 social and health services, must establish a concurrent and expedited
28 process to assist grant applicants in meeting any applicable
29 regulatory requirements necessary to operate inpatient psychiatric
30 beds, freestanding evaluation and treatment facilities, enhanced
31 services facilities, triage facilities, crisis stabilization
32 facilities, or secure detoxification/secure withdrawal management and
33 stabilization facilities.

34 (12) In contracts for grants authorized under this section, the
35 department must include provisions that require that the grantee or
36 successor hold the capital improvements for at least a 10-year
37 period. The provisions must require the facility to be used for
38 behavioral health services, but may allow the facility to change
39 ownership or facility type during the commitment period. The

1 department shall monitor the activities of recipients of grants under
2 this program to determine compliance with the terms and conditions
3 set forth in its contract.

4 (13) The department must provide a progress report to the
5 appropriate committees of the legislature by November 1, 2026. The
6 report must include:

7 (a) The total number of applications and amount of funding
8 requested;

9 (b) A list and description of the projects approved for funding
10 including state funding, total project cost, services anticipated to
11 be provided, bed capacity, and anticipated completion date;

12 (c) A statewide map of new capacity since 2018, including
13 projected bed capacity and opening dates;

14 (d) A status report of projects that received funding in prior
15 funding rounds, including details about the project completion and
16 the date the facility began providing services; and

17 (e) Recommendations for statutory language that would codify the
18 grant program on an ongoing basis including:

19 (i) Evaluation and prioritization criteria;

20 (ii) Monitoring and compliance requirements;

21 (iii) Preconstruction and technical assistance services; and

22 (iv) Data needed to determine the service needs by area of the
23 state.

24 (14) The department must coordinate with the health care
25 authority and department of health to submit capital budget requests
26 to fund behavioral health community capacity grants for the 2027-2029
27 biennial budget by the due date established by the office of
28 financial management. Associated state budget operating costs must
29 also be identified and requested.

13 2025-27 Connecting Housing to Infrastructure Program (40000675)

14 The appropriation in this section is subject to the following
15 conditions and limitations:

16 (1) (a) The appropriation in this section is provided solely for
17 grants or deferred loans to local governments and public utility
18 districts to defray the cost of waiving a portion of or all of the
19 fees normally applied to developers for utility connection charges
20 and related street improvements related to new affordable housing
21 projects for low- and moderate-income households.

22 (b) Where applicable, the utility extension and related street
23 improvements must be consistent with the approved comprehensive plans
24 under the growth management act and must be within the established
25 boundaries of the urban growth area as set forth in the approved
26 comprehensive plans. Street improvements are eligible if the
27 improvements are related directly to the utility extension or
28 connection and are adjacent to the new housing units being
29 constructed.

30 (c) Projects must be located within a jurisdiction that imposes a
31 sales and use tax under RCW 82.14.530(1)(a)(ii) or (b)(i)(B),
32 82.14.540, or 84.52.105.

33 (2) (a) \$30,000,000 of the state building construction account—
34 state appropriation is provided solely for grants or deferred loans
35 for system development charges, utility improvements, and street
36 improvements associated with utility infrastructure for affordable
37 housing projects serving low-income households located within a city
38 or county with a population of 150,000 or fewer persons.

1 (b) \$5,000,000 of the state building construction account—state
2 appropriation in this section is provided for the department for
3 pilot grants for system development charges, utility improvements,
4 and street improvements associated with utility infrastructure for
5 affordable housing projects serving moderate-income households. The
6 pilot program must be offered in three counties located in the north
7 central region of the state. The counties must share borders with one
8 another, be located east of the crest of the Cascade mountains, and
9 each have a population of 85,000 persons or fewer. By June 1, 2027,
10 the department must submit a report to the office of financial
11 management and to the appropriate committees of the legislature that:

12 (i) Summarizes the results of the pilot program, including an
13 analysis of the need for infrastructure assistance for local
14 governments to support the development of housing affordable to
15 moderate-income households, and the benefits to communities that may
16 result from increasing economic diversity in housing that is made
17 more affordable through infrastructure subsidies;

18 (ii) Describes the number and total dollar amount of application
19 requests and funding awards; and

20 (iii) Makes recommendations regarding continuation or expansion
21 of the pilot program and recommended future funding levels.

22 (3) To be eligible for funding under this section, an applicant
23 must demonstrate, at minimum:

24 (a) That affordable housing development will begin construction
25 within 24 months of the grant or loan award; and

26 (b) A strong probability of serving the original target group or
27 income level for a period of at least 25 years.

28 (4) For purposes of this section, the following definitions
29 apply.

30 (a) "Affordable housing" means residential housing that requires
31 payment of monthly housing costs, including utilities other than
32 telephone, of no more than 30 percent of the household's income.

33 (b) "Low-income household" has the same meaning as in RCW
34 43.185A.010.

35 (c) "Moderate-income household" means: For purposes of the pilot
36 program authorized in this section, a single person, family, or

 13 have documented proof of indoor air quality performance that does not
 14 meet current state energy code; (iii) with outdated or
 15 underperforming HVAC systems; and (iv) that have the most limited
 16 financial capacity.

17 (3) The office of the superintendent of public instruction must
 18 first allocate, to the maximum extent feasible, the funding
 19 appropriated under this section to grants prioritized under
 20 subsections (1) and (2) of this section. However, as necessary to
 21 award grants using the climate commitment account—state appropriation
 22 in this section, the superintendent of public instruction may also
 23 prioritize grants under this section that will improve compliance
 24 with the state's energy-related building standards in chapter 19.27A
 25 RCW by reducing energy use intensity.

26 (4) The state building construction account—state appropriation
 27 in this section is subject to the provisions of section 8018 of this
 28 act.

5 RCW 43.88.031 requires the disclosure of the estimated debt
6 service costs associated with new capital bond appropriations. The
7 estimated debt service costs for the appropriations contained in this
8 act are (~~(\$73,258,483)~~) \$46,425,516 for the 2025-2027 biennium,
9 (~~(\$410,061,655)~~) \$390,379,123 for the 2027-2029 biennium, and
10 (~~(\$631,176,449)~~) \$584,977,090 for the 2029-2031 biennium.

11 **Sec. 8002.** 2025 c 414 s 8002 (uncodified) is amended to read as
12 follows:

13 (1) The following agencies may enter into financial contracts,
14 paid from any funds of an agency, appropriated or nonappropriated,
15 for the purposes indicated and in not more than the principal amounts
16 indicated, plus financing expenses and required reserves pursuant to
17 chapter 39.94 RCW. When securing properties under this section,
18 agencies shall use the most economical financial contract option
19 available, including long-term leases, lease-purchase agreements,
20 lease-development with option to purchase agreements or financial
21 contracts using certificates of participation. Expenditures made by

27 (g) Enter into a financing contract on behalf of Spokane
28 Community College for up to \$15,000,000 plus financing expenses,

31 **Sec. 8003.** 2025 c 414 s 8004 (uncodified) is amended to read as
32 follows:

33 (1) The legislature finds that use of life-cycle cost analysis
34 will aid public entities, architects, engineers, and contractors in
35 making design and construction decisions that positively impact both
36 the initial construction cost and the ongoing operating and
37 maintenance cost of a project. To ensure that the total cost of a
38 project is accounted for and the most reasonable and cost efficient
39 design is used, agencies shall develop life-cycle costs for any

1 construction project over \$10,000,000. The life-cycle costs must
2 represent the present value sum of capital costs, installation costs,
3 operating costs, and maintenance costs over the life expectancy of
4 the project. The legislature further finds the most effective

22 (5) If a minor works appropriation does not specify it is to be
23 used for preservation or program improvements, up to 25 percent of
24 the appropriation may be used for program improvements. Improvements
25 for accessibility in compliance with the Americans with disabilities
26 act qualify as preservation improvements.
27 (6) Agencies must use reappropriations before newly appropriated
28 amounts without regard to lists or projects that were submitted at
29 the time the funds were appropriated.
30 (7) No later than (~~December 15th~~) October 1st of each even
31 numbered year, agencies must submit to the governor, house capital
32 budget committee, and senate ways and means committee, a list of
33 minor works projects completed or in progress for the current

26 commerce must comply with the criteria outlined in this section.

27 (2) Grant funds may solely be used to pay for the following
28 construction related expenses:

29 (a) Design, architectural, and engineering work;

30 (b) Building permits and fees;

32 not affect the operation of the remainder of this act in its
33 application to the agencies concerned. Rules adopted under this act
34 must meet federal requirements that are a necessary condition to the
35 receipt of federal funds by the state.

1 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 8015.** If any provision of this act or its
2 application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the

7 the state government and its existing public institutions, and takes
8 effect immediately.
